CARPENTIER PICKS LONG ISLAND FOR TRAINING PLACE

Expecta Cooler Weather Than He Could Get on the Jersey Coast; Picks Spar Parer.

PARIS, April 22.—(A. P.)—Georges Carpentier, European heavyweight box champion, who is to start shortly for the U. S. to fight Jack Dempsey, will have his training quarters at Long Beach, Long Island, instead of at Hammik, N. J. Carpentier expects to be much cooler at the seashore there. He also wired Joe Jeannette, asking Jeannette to act as his chief sparring partner and adviser. Carpentier said today that no matter who wins the battle he did not think the bout would last more than four rounds.

SPEED OF FAST HORSES ABOUT AS GREAT AS MEN WILL EVER BE ABLE TO GET THEM, BELIEF

Professor Anderson Declares Final Possibilities Have Been Reached by Selection.

LEXINGTON, Ky., April 22.—(A. P.)—The limit in speed of trotting and running horses has almost been reached, according to Prof. W. R. Anderson of the Kentucky State College of Agriculture. Improvement in the future will be much slower than at any time in years passed, he said.

Prof. Anderson has been making a special study of record-holding "Standard-bred" trotters and "thoroughbred" runners, and bases his conclusion on a study of records and histories of the animals covering a period of more than 50 years.

In 40 years, the record of three-year-old trotters has been lowered from 2:49 to 2:02 1/2, a reduction of 37 1/2 seconds, Professor Anderson finds. In 48 years the American record of running horses over a distance of one mile has been lowered from 1:42 1/2 to 1:34 4/5, a reduction of six and four-fifths seconds. Neither breed has failed to make improvement during a generation, according to Prof. Anderson, and in some cases improvement has been as rapid that many new records have been made in the life of a single horse.

The gradual improvement in the speed of trotting horses, according to Prof. Anderson, is shown clearly by the records of three-year-olds and the years they were made. These are as follows:

1860, Elvira Whiteside, 2:39; 1874, Lady Stout, 2:29; 1882, Hinda Rose, 2:19 1/2; 1889, Axtell, 2:14; 1892, Aton, 2:10 1/2; 1910, Colorado E., 2:04 1/2; 1914, Peter Volo, 2:03 1/2; 1917, The Real Lady, 2:02 and 1920, Sister Bertha, 2:02 1/2.

When Peter Volo established his unexpected race record of 2:02 1/2, in 1914 the prediction was made that the limit of speed for his age had been reached, but Miss Bertha Dillon equalled the record in 1917 while The Real Lady cut one-half second off it. Three years later, Sister Bertha, a full sister of Miss Bertha Dillon, placed the time at 2:02 1/2. Prof. Anderson said that there are reasons to believe that the ambition of breeders to place the three-year-old record at two minutes may be realized.

Peter the Great, Stoughton A. Fletcher's great stallion, has played an important part in the improvement of trotting horses, according to Prof. Anderson. This great sire has produced 59 horses—which have made records from 2:10 down to 2:01 1/2. He also sired Mrs. Harris M., which holds the record as the fastest pacing mare in the world with a mark of 1:58 1/2.

Some idea of the progress made by running horses, according to the professor, may be obtained from a record

of their achievements which follow: 1872, Alarm, 1:42 1/2; 1875, Searcher, 1:41 1/2; 1877, Ten Broeck (against time) 1:39 1/2; 1890, Racine, 1:39; and Salvador (straight course) 1:35; 1900, Voter and Orimar, 1:33; 1901, Braggard, 1:37 4/5; 1902, Dick Welles, 1:37 2/5; 1908, Center Shot, 1:37 1/5; 1914, Amalfi, 1:36 1/2; 1918, St. Brier, 1:36 1/5; 1918, Hoamer (against time) 1:34 4/5; and 1920, Man O'War, 1:37 4/5.

The most remarkable thing about the running records, Prof. Anderson said, is the fact that Man O'War, a three-year-old, holds the record for all ages of thoroughbred horses in a race.

WHEAT BELT LEAGUE SUCCEEDS THE BLUE MOUNTAIN COMBINE

Organization of New Body Got Under Way at Meeting Here Last Night; Games Sunday.

HARRY L. KUCK is president, Dr. H. A. Schneider, vice president, and Fred H. Moon, secretary-treasurer, of the new Wheat Belt League that was organized last night at a meeting of representatives from Helix, Pilot Rock, Weston and Pendleton. The meeting was held at the rooms of the Commercial Association.

Action in organizing the new league results from the withdrawal of the Helix club from the Blue Mountain league Wednesday when the remaining five clubs would not agree to change the bylaws to permit Helix the privilege of importing a catcher from Walla Walla for every game. Withdrawal of one club made it imperative either to fill the vacated place or to cut to a four-club league, and on account of the extra expense incurred in traveling to Milton-Freewater, it was decided to cut the size.

The season will begin Sunday, the new schedule which was presented last night having been accepted without a murmur. For the opener, Helix will come to Pendleton to meet the Bucks, and Weston goes to Pilot Rock. Each team will play eight games, four at home and four away and the season will come to a close June 12. Umpires are to be Fred Grove of Pilot Rock and Tracy Baker of Pendleton.

Besides the officers who were elected last night, the destinies of the league will be in the hands of the following directors: Treasurer, Peterson of Pendleton, Dr. Schneider of Pilot Rock, Fred Moss of Helix and H. L. Baymond of Weston. The managers who attended last night's harmony meeting included C. W. Paulus of Pilot Rock, Victor Mason of Helix and Marshall Spell of the Pendleton Bucks.

The schedule calls for the following games:

- April 24—Helix at Pendleton, Weston at Pilot Rock.
- May 1—Pendleton at Weston, Pilot Rock at Helix.
- May 8—Helix at Weston, Pilot Rock at Pendleton.
- May 15—Pendleton at Pilot Rock, Weston at Helix.
- May 22—Pilot Rock at Weston, Helix at Pendleton.
- May 29—Helix at Pilot Rock, Weston at Pendleton.
- June 5—Weston at Pilot Rock, Pendleton at Helix.
- June 12—Pendleton at Weston, Pilot Rock at Helix.
