A letter from the general of agriculture of Mexico has been received at the office of the Commercial Association in which inquiry is made as to the possibilities of the southern neighbor establishing a market here for tropical fruits and vegetables. Quotations on these products are sought by the department to serve as information to be put out by the national government of Mexico for the benefit of farmers and fruit growers.

Senator Proebstel Very Low
Word was received here today by Cyril Proebstel, deputy county clerk, that his grandfather ex-Senator G. W. Proebstel, is very ill at his home in Weston. For some time Senator Proebstel lived in Portland but he recently returned to Eastern Oregon, going first to Hot Lake. He passed through here several days ago enroute to Weston. He is 85 years of age and it is feared he may not live longer than a few days.

Adams Man Dies
Illness which had impaired his health over a period of three or four years resulted this morning at 8 o'clock in the death of Charles Smith, a resident of Adams. The wife, Mrs. Manda Smith, and two sisters, Mrs. Harvey Horn who lives near the Mission, and Mrs. Frank La Fave survive him. A niece lives in Montana. Definite funeral arrangements have not been made, but it is probable that the obsequies will be held Monday afternoon at 2 o'clock. The deceased was a member of the Catholic church.

The first of a series of six registered shoots to be held by the Pendleton Rod and Gun club under the rules of the American Trapshooting Association will be held tomorrow at Collins' park between the hours of 10 and 2. The other shoots will be held during the Sundays of May and will come to a close May 29. Fifty targets every Sunday will be shot, and the national organization will offer trophies for the best scores won. A great deal of interest is being manifested in the events, and a large entry of marksmen is expected to participate.

Theft Makes Escape
A woman flower thief narrowly escaped capture at the E. E. Baitzore residence 215 Thompson street, when residents in the house pursued her after she had succeeded in gathering armloads of daffodils, tulips and hyacinths last night. The woman is described as young and well dressed, made her escape by running beyond the high school. In the letter Mr. Kirby writes that while stopping here with a car he had purchased from George N. Crossfield of Wasco, William Lyday, traffic officer, removed the license plates of the former owner which had been loaned to him for his trip to Boise and that he was compelled to make the trip the rest of the way without plates.
