CLUB WILL BREAKFAST

The club members will devote the hours of the usual afternoon meeting to rehearsal of the two plays, "Spreading the News" and "The Well of the Saints" to be presented next Tuesday evening, May 3, at the state hospital auditorium. The plays portray the lives of the Irish peasant class of years ago and the characters speak the brogue common to the Celts. In "The Well of the Saints" two blind peasants, man and wife, each of whom believes that the other is very beautiful, are given their sight. Disillusionment follows, for the couple, in reality, are not beautiful. The play ends with the return of the two to their former state, and the restoration of happiness.

The repetition and elaboration of a bit of idle gossip forms the theme for

"Spreading the News." An Irish peasant picks up a haysfork with the intention of returning it to a neighbor. A chain of rumor begins, and ends in the story that the peasant has killed his neighbor. The latter, as a climax, appears and quells all apprehension as to his safety when he announces that he is alive and ready to kill anyone who doubts the fact.

Costumes faithful to the period will be used and the plays promise to be exceedingly interesting. Mrs. W. D. McNary is directing the productions.
