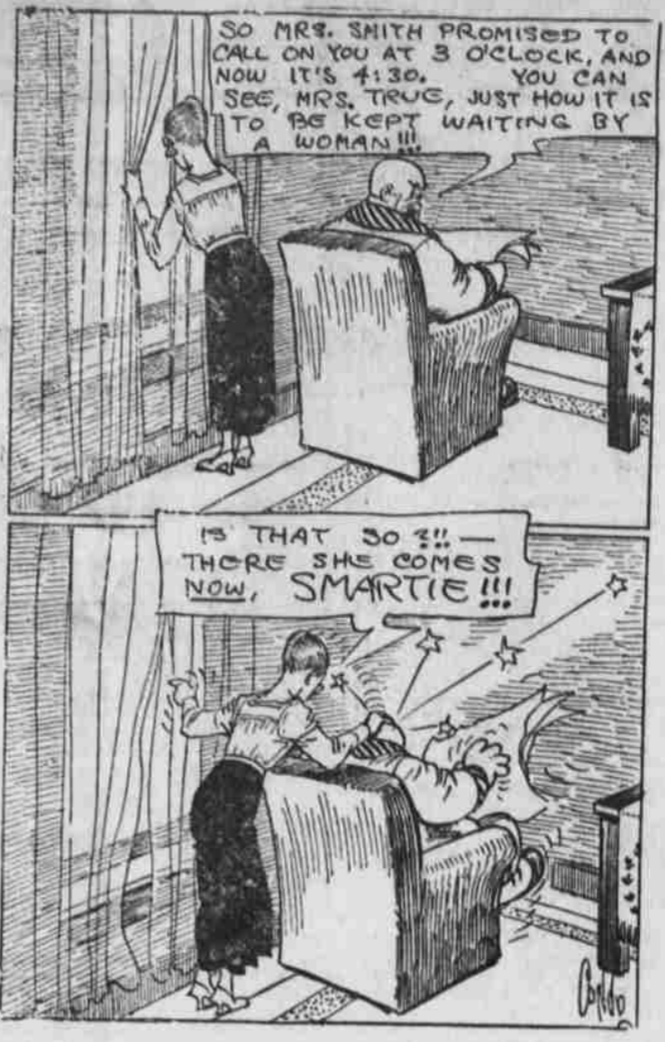

Average prices were at highest levels

in the last hour, steels then superseding all other issues at gains of two to four points. United States Steel moved in a narrow radius, but hardened at the end with a net gain of 1-1/2 points.

Sales amounted to \$85,000,000

United States Steel earnings for the first quarter, issued after the close of the session, totaled net profit \$22,300,000 this being under general estimates and leaving only a narrow margin over dividend requirements.

Seasoned bonds of the railway division

were adversely affected by the more attractive terms of the Chicago, Burlington & Quincy offerings and liberty issues were heavy with a low record for the registered 3-1-2s. Total sales, par value, \$9,775,000.

Export Buying

Strengthens Wheat

CHICAGO, April 27.—(A. P.)—Export buying on a large scale turned the wheat market yesterday from weakness to strength. The close, although unsettled, was 1/4c net higher with May 1.26 1/2 to 1.26 3/4 and July 1.05 1/2 to 1.05 3/4. Corn finished at 1 1/4c net decline to 5-8 1/2c advance.

Estimates were current that wheat export business

the last 48 hours had totaled as high as two million bushels. During the first half of the day, however, before the volume of the purchasing for Europe was well understood, the bulls were at a disadvantage. General selling in small lots took place and moderate declines resulted.

Melons Growers Say

Business Faces Rain. WASHINGTON, April 27.—(A. P.)—Declaring their record crop, valued at \$11,000,000, was threatened with loss through high freight rates, cantaloupe growers of the Imperial Valley, California, placed their plight today before western members of congress and executive officials.

The cost of growing cantaloupes

in the Imperial valley this year, they said, will amount to \$1 a crate while the average freight charged under present rates total \$1.77 a crate. Inability to market the coming crop, they added, would mean extermination of the industry.

Steel Business Not So Profitable

NEW YORK, April 27.—(A. P.)—The business of the United States Steel corporation for the first quarter of the calendar year, as disclosed in the report of the directors issued today, testified anew to the backward conditions in that industry.

Total earnings for that period

amounted to \$32,286,722, as compared with \$12,877,862 in the final quarter of 1920. Net income of \$20,624,329 showed a decrease of \$11,048,477 and surplus of \$2,816,965 compared with \$14,481,446 in the previous quarter.

The statement was considerably below

general forecasts and leaves only \$1.89 earned on the common stock as against \$4.09 in the last quarter. Taken as a whole, the statement was the least favorable of any since that of the same period in 1915, when total earnings amounted to \$35,512,354.

The usual dividends of 1 1/4 per cent

quarterly on the preferred and 1 1/4 per cent on the common were declared.

Railroad Payroll Shows Big Increase

OTTAWA, April 27.—(A. P.)—The payroll of the Canadian National Railway increased from \$43,265,581 to \$83,347,836 between June 29, 1918, and the end of last year, A. J. Mitchell, vice president in charge of finance today, told the house of commons, which is investigating government owned railways and shipping. He attributed the increase to the McAdoo wage awards.

The retroactive feature of the so-called

Chicago awards, he asserted, had cost the Canadian National railway \$8,911,255 in back pay.

Will Accept

SPOKANE, April 27.—(A. P.)—Coopers here have voted to accept wage reductions of \$1.50 to \$2 per day, effective May 1, it was announced today when new contracts were presented to owners of barrel manufacturing plants. The new wages will range from \$5.50 to \$6 daily. The present scale is from \$6 to \$8 per day.

KANSAS CITY, April 27.—(A. P.)—Cattle and hogs unchanged. Sheep 7000; steady to 25c lower; sheep Texas as wethers 6.00; cows 6.00; short lambs steady to strong; woolled lambs steady to 10c lower; 55-pound Colorado 10.55.

File New Tariff Asking Rate Increase

OLYMPIA, Wash., April 27.—(A. P.)—Proposed rate increases on all class and miscellaneous railroad shipments in Western Washington effective May 27, are included in a new tariff filed yesterday by S. J. Henry as agent for the North Pacific Freight Bureau of Seattle. The new schedule, listed as I. B. replaces schedule I-A which was filed by the bureau to become effective last August with the general increase of 25 per cent allowed by the interstate commerce commission but withdrawn after protest by shippers.

The latest schedule fixes a rate of 75c

for a hundred pounds on first class shipments from Seattle to Portland, an increase from 47c. The former schedule which was withdrawn, fixed the Seattle-Portland rate at \$1.08. From Seattle to Aberdeen, the latest tariff makes a rate of 75c on first class shipments and from Seattle to Bellingham 60c. On the Grays Harbor route Seattle receives the same rate as Tacoma. The rate from Seattle to Olympia remain at 62 1/2c.

MUMIFIED BODY FOUND

COPENHAGEN, April 27.—(A. P.)—The mummified body of a woman who died 3,000 years ago was found recently buried in a field in the Jutland district of Denmark and is being unwrapped by employees of the National Museum. Her coffin was the hollow trunk of an oak tree and the body was wrapped in a cow hide. She appears to have been a person of rank. Her garments included a short jacket with sleeves and a petticoat and she wore two belts around her wrist and two bracelets on her arms.

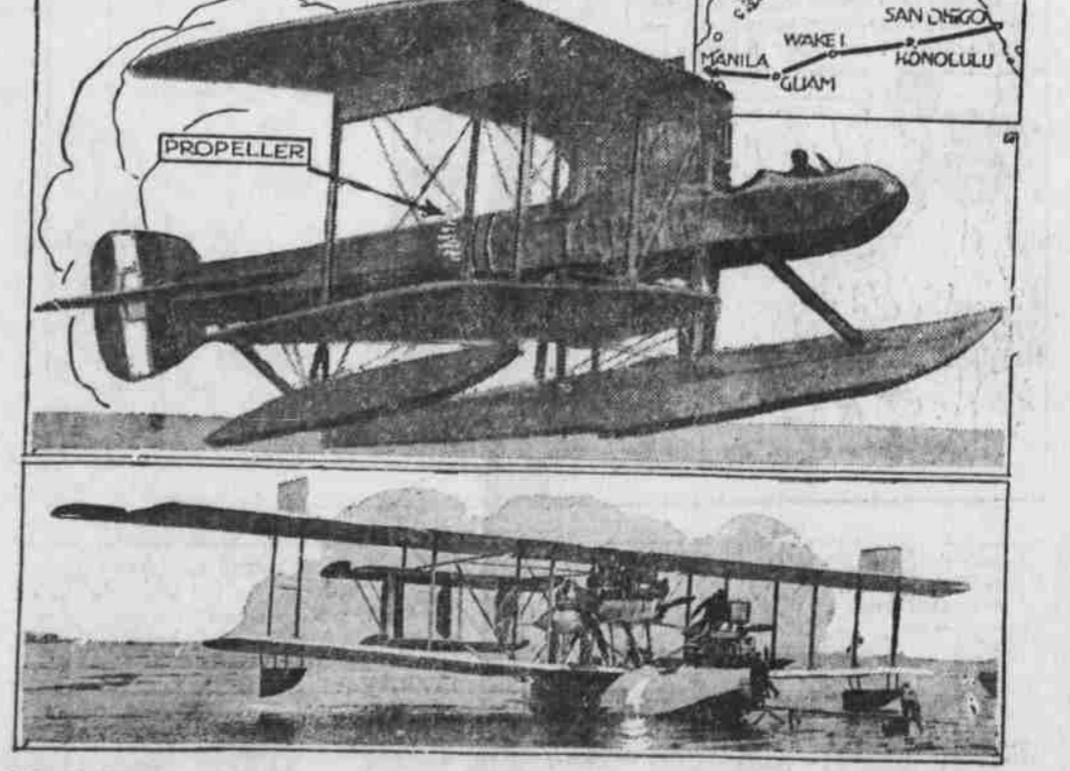
WILL WRITE ARIEL HISTORY

SHERIDAN, Wyr., April 27.—So future generations may know how the first mail flyers crossed the continent just as the present generation knows about the men and women who crossed in '49 in "prairie schooners," a history of the first air mail flight has been written by E. E. Ailene, one of the fliers who made the trip. The history has been presented to the Wyoming State Historical society by Major E. P. Taylor.

"NOW FOR THE PACIFIC!" SAYS U. S. NAVY



The U. S. Navy, first to fly the Atlantic, intends to be first to fly the Pacific. Below is the N. C. 4 which first flew the Atlantic and above is the Gallaudet plane—the type which will make the Pacific flight late this fall or early next spring. Inset map shows the route to Manila, 6200 miles. The landing spot on the Asiatic mainland has not been selected. Construction has been going on secretly for a year on the giant which will start across the Pacific. It will be just like the Gallaudet above—torpedo noses and concealed engines—except that it will be three times as big. It will have three nacelles—three "noses"—three propellers and three Liberty motors to each propeller. The arrow indicates the greatest novelty of the new plane—the location of the propeller, which reduces wind friction to a minimum. The trial one-propeller Gallaudet above recently made 1323 miles an hour. The giant is expected to make 110 miles an hour carrying a crew of 12 men.
