TOWNLEY DOES NOT WORRY ABOUT ACTION OF SUPREME COURT

President of Non-Partisan League is Touring State in Interests of the League.

BEAVER CITY, Neb., April 26.—(A. P.)—A. C. Townley, president of the National Non-Partisan League, told an audience he addressed here last night that he was not worrying about the action of the Minnesota supreme court at St. Paul today in denying him a new trial on a charge of conspiracy to teach sedition. He added he did not want his audience to worry about it, either.
 Mr. Townley, who opened his address with a reference to the court's action, said that if he was put in jail it would be the first, not he has had in ten years. The sentence, he added, was only for 30 days, which he declared was not as much as a chicken thief would get out here.
 Mr. Townley, who has been touring parts of the state in the interests of the league, arrived here last night from Holdrege, where he delivered an address last night. Through one of his friends, who accompanied him here it was learned that he had no formal statement to issue last night concerning the court's action.
