GEORGETOWN ATHLETE WINS PENTATHLON AND DESCH SETS LOW RECORD FOR 440 HURDLES

Meet at Philadelphia Displays
Real Talent in Events; Paris
Team Lends Foreign Touch.

PHILADELPHIA, April 29.—(A. P.)—The establishing of a new world's record for the 440-yard hurdles by A. Desch of Notre Dame university, and the excellent all-around performance of Robert Legendre of Georgetown university, in winning the pentathlon, were the outstanding features of the annual University of Pennsylvania relay carnival which opened yesterday.

The international atmosphere of the meet was furnished by the University of Paris team, which finished fourth in the sprint medley relay championship race.

Desch, who was a member of the last United States Olympic team and won third place in the 440-meter hurdles, opened the two-day track and field games at Franklin field by scoring over the 2-1/2 foot quarter mile hurdles in the splendid time of 23.47 seconds. He cut 2-3 of a second from

the best previous time, made over the same course last season by J. W. Watt of Cornell.

Desch jumped into a lead almost as soon as the first hurdle was cleared, winning by a comfortable margin with Pittman second and Hill third.

Legendre again demonstrated that he is one of the best all-around athletes in the country by winning first place in the pentathlon from a class field.

Five events composed the pentathlon: the broad jump, javelin throw, 200-meter run, discus throw and the 1500-meter run. Points were allotted to each man in the order in which he finished in each contest. Legendre was first with the low score of 10 points; Justin Hamilton of the University of Missouri, was second with 12; Bradley, Kansas university, third with 16; Barlett fourth with 19. C. Reinhardt, Muhlenberg college, and V. Camp of the United States naval academy, tied for fifth place with 20 points. These five athletes were the only survivors of the 21 which started in the all-around contest.

The tall and powerfully built Georgetown athlete won four firsts out of the five events. In the javelin throw he finished sixth. Legendre

captured the running broad jump with a leap of 21 feet 11 inches; won the 200-meter dash in 23.5 seconds; the discus throw with 124 feet 3 inches; and the 1500-meter run in 16:04 minutes: 20 seconds. Barlett, who won the javelin hurl set a new carnival record for this event by sending the shaft 143 feet 11 1/4 inches. This, however, is considerably short of the American record and the world record.

The medley relay championships, which also featured the first day's program, were of a more casual character than individual running events. In the 400-meter relay, the championship went to the Hamilton high school quartet of Boston which won with a record to spare 1:27; the Cedar Rapids team.

Stington set a new record for the event of 1:22 minutes 23.5 seconds. The former record 1:44, was made by Koster last year.

The international sprint relay championship proved a popular victory for the University of Pennsylvania runners. Earl Doss, the anchor, was reported into the lead as the close of the mile contest after taking the pace from Lafayette and Princeton runners during the final half mile relay. The University of Paris quartette made its first appearance in American competition in this event and while the French four, consisting of Roger, Sarrin, Couilleux and Pery, was not quite up to the speed set by the pace-making teams it managed to finish fourth place, although without the previous of Captain Delvart, who was ill.

The distance medley relay was a close-run victory for western runners. The University of Illinois, with the Ohio State team at its heels, won after a grueling struggle carried almost to the finish tape. Eastern colleges divided the balance of the honors in this event, Pennsylvania being third and Columbia fourth.

The races were run under a leaden, drizzling sky and after the first few events the rain slowed up both track and field to such an extent that record breaking was out of the question.
