WESTON BITES DUST AS RESULT OF GAME WITH BUCKS SUNDAY

Locals Lead League by Virtue of Two Victories; Williams Allows Only Two Hits

The Pendleton Buckaroos won from Weston Sunday, 7 to 0, and with the victory the honor of leading the Wheat Belt league. Two victories and no defeats are the chalk marks that appear to the credit of the local players as a result of having put Helix and Weston in the goose egg column.

Two hits by the Bucks and three errors on the part of Kennard who was playing short in Pendleton's part of the third inning were responsible for four runs that tied up the game.

The scoring started after there were two men out, Olson and Huey had popped easy ones to the infield. Captain Peterson then came to bat and walked on to left field for a double, and he scored on Styson's single which he stretched to a triple on errors on the part of Oliver, Weston's center fielder. Hanley drew a walk and Cary and Gordon and Duff made first on Kennard's fielding errors, scores being made by Styson, Hanley and Cary.

The Bucks also got one in the first inning. Again in the fourth they chalked up a tally after Olson had walked and stolen second. Huey popped an easy fly to second, and Peterson struck out. Styson poked one over the fence in the left garden which scored Olson. Hanley knocked a long fly to center which dropped in a well and Styson died at third with one score added.

The Weston aggregation made Sid Williams get up and go just once during the game and that was in the sixth when a bobble might have permitted the opposition to score. Bill drew a base on balls to start things but he was out when Blomgren hit to the infield and was safe on fielder's choice. In an attempted double play Gould was safe on a close decision at first while Blomgren was thrown out at third. An easy one that Beamer knocked to Williams made the third out and retired the side.

Styson got Pendleton's final score in the seventh inning when after he had walked, Oliver dropped Hanley's hard drive, and advanced on sacrifice flies by Cary and Gordon.

The Bucks secured eight hits off of Helix and Kennard and Williams allowed two to the Weston gang. Box score and summary:

DEFEAT OF LA GRANDE HIGH SCHOOL TRACK ATHLETES IS EASY

Hanley's Men Spring Surprise by Snowing Under Visitors by Score of 91 to 31 Here.

Pendleton high school won the first track meet Saturday when they defeated the La Grande high school by a score of 91-31 at the Round-Up grounds. The winning of the meet yesterday puts Pendleton in the limelight as one of the strongest contenders for the Eastern Oregon championship.

Pendleton had done out before hand that it would take the relay to decide the meet and during the first few events this thought was carried out for the two teams tied in several of the events. However Pendleton began coming up strong and with each event her score grew more and more over La Grande.

Dick Hanley's men all showed up fine and their excellent spring training stood out strong. La Grande's men were in no condition to run against Pendleton. The cause being the weather in that city for the past several weeks.

Pendleton's high point man was John Saunders with 19 1/2 points. Saunders is one of Pendleton's old regulars in track and will help her a lot in the county and Eastern Oregon meets. His strong events are the pole vault, high jump, 220 yard dash and the 100 yard dash. John's brother Carmen who is also an excellent track man and good for at least 14 points is on the sick list and was unable to participate in the meet. Lawrence Warner was second highest with 14 points followed by his brother Byron with 12. Richard Lawrence gave evidence of a future in track by taking three second places the first year out. Snyder and Kramer were next with 5 points each to add to Pendleton's score. Earnhart gathered in 6 points as did Ivan La Hue. Hunter took second in the mile run. The relay team composed of Chas. Snyder, Byron Warner, Lawrence Warner and John Saunders was responsible for the rest of the score.

The 400 yard race was won by Pendleton taking all three places. This was considered one of the most strenuous races but P. H. S. proved too much for them. Lawrence Warner was the first to finish in one of the best times ever made in high schools, the time being 2:25. Richard Lawrence was second and Richard Earnhart third. Warner made a very pretty finish in this race. Larson of La Grande took fourth place. Pendleton also took all three places in the 800 yard race. John Saunders winning another first, Ivan La Hue second and Whitman of Pendleton taking third.

Hunter of Pendleton and Blokland of La Grande ran the mile race and neck making one of the most exciting races of the day. Blokland finished a few inches before Hunter. Kingwood of La Grande taking third place. The time for this event was very good for high schools, being 5:06.2.

With Earnhart and Lawrence the locals come back strong in the 800. These men won the race easily. With better competition they would have set a new record for this event. Both of these men are inexperienced but from the events yesterday they are expected to be Pendleton's strong men before the season is over. They will both be in school next year.

John Saunders did not have to work very hard to beat Black of La Grande in the pole vault. La Hue of Pendleton took third. Saunders' vault was 2 feet 4 inches.

Chas. Snyder easily took the broad jump and La Hue came third. Theison of La Grande taking second. Snyder's jump was 19 feet 1 inch. Snyder also placed second in the 220. He will be a very valuable man to Pendleton the rest of the season and next year.

Blokland was high point man for the visitors with 8 points to his credit. Bean and Larson had the same number of points. Theison was next with 2 points.

Judges of the finish were, J. A. Murray, Harry Kuck and Gus Barry.
