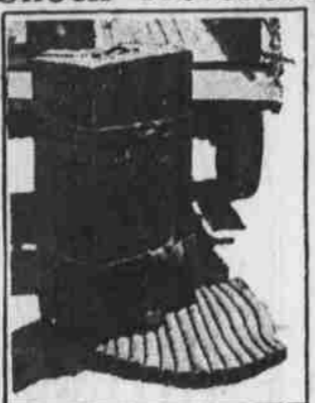
Managers to Meet.

Insurance Deposit Boxes
A new service on the part of the American National bank has been assured by the taking out of a \$100,000 insurance policy on the safety deposit vaults of the institution against robbery and burglary. Under the terms of the contract which was written by Bentley and Hodges, local agents for the Aetna company, the contents of each box may be protected up to a valuation of \$10,000 to the lessee of the boxes. Several banks of the country have recently taken this step to strengthen the interests of patrons.

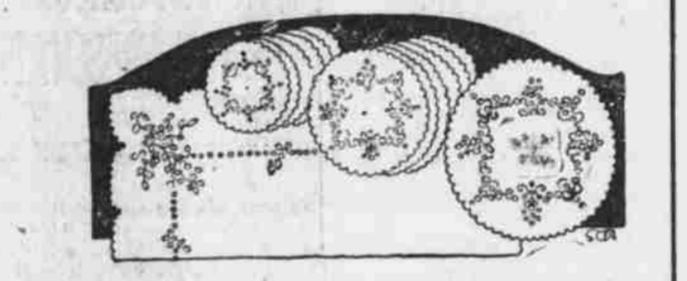
