## CORBETT FAVORED AS THIRD MAN IN RING FOR FIGHT

### Dempsey and Carpenter Have Right to Select Referee From List; Six Prospects.

NEW YORK, May 6.—With the naming of the site and the date for the Dempsey-Carpenter scrap, the next important detail is the selection of a referee.

The champion and the challenger will be allowed to decide upon the third man in the ring from a list of six prominent ring figures listed in the original agreement.

James J. Corbett, James Jeffries, James Dougherty, Robert Edgren, Otto Floto and Bill Brown comprise the list of candidates.

Recently it has been reported that this list is not binding and that Jim Corbett might be named.

The choice of the principals is subject to the approval of Tex Rickard, promoter of the bout.

While Rickard has not opened his mouth on the question, it is understood he favors Corbett. The former heavy-weight champion is very popular and has a big name in the sport, and his preference in the ring would be a step further in Rickard's plan to make the show the greatest in history.

Corbett is high in the esteem of Carpenter and Dempsey but this may cause disfavor in the Dempsey camp. The same may be said of Bob Ezzen, former sport editor of the New

York Evening World, who is a personal friend of the champion, which may cause him to be opposed in the French fold.

Bill Egan perhaps is the least known of the sextet out of New York. He is a prominent referee with long experience in the ring. He is reported to be Governor Miller's choice for the chair of the new state boxing commission. The other candidates are well known, but are not so prominent.

"Any one of the officials suggested would be satisfactory to us," Jack Kearney, manager of the champion, said.

Dempsey's attitude is not known, but Victor Drever, Rickard's Paris agent, recently cabled here that Dempsey had suggested to him it would not be a bad idea to have a Frenchman for one of the judges.

Under the no-decision regulations which prevail in New Jersey much of the responsibility will be removed from the shoulders of the referee. Judgment in counting and accuracy of the eyes in detecting fouls will be the most important requisites.

## CALIFORNIA REGRETS STRAINED RELATIONS

FERNSELEY, Cal., May 6.—(A. P.)—No official word reached the University of California here to confirm reports that athletic relations between the University of Oregon and California are strained. Luther Nichols, California's graduate manager, said today, "California does not want to break with Oregon. Mr. Nichols declares, and notes the reports are false.

The reports, which came from Eugene, where the Oregon school is located, said one of the principal reasons for the strained relationship was the fact California is sending its first string track team to the Intercollegiate Amateur Athletic Association of America to meet at Harvard university May 27-28 instead of to the Pacific coast conference meet at Eugene, May 21, Oregon, it was said, was not pleased by California's plan and would not welcome the near second team, which the local authorities offered to send.

Mr. Nichols explained that California must enter the I. C. A. A. A. meet at least once every two years in order to keep its membership in the association and this year's team is being sent because it has made a good showing and has an excellent opportunity of placing high. California, he said, would like to enter both meets, but such a feat is impossible because they are only a week apart and are being held on opposite sides of the continent.

REGAIN LEADERSHIP. OAKLAND, Cal., May 6.—(A. P.)—Sacramento hit optimistically and supported Pitty in the game, winning from San Francisco, 2 to 1, and regaining the coast league leadership. Pitty's side in the eighth scored five and Orr with another grand slam. Sacramento's three double plays were unassisted.
