3000 Autos Crossed. The official count of the number of automobiles crossing the Snake river bridge at Burbank yesterday shows that 3000 cars made use of the bridge during the day, according to Gus Bartholot, Northern Pacific conductor.

Rights of Way Given. About 40 farmers of the Holdman district met yesterday afternoon to discuss the right of way for the Cold Springs road, which has been routed from Holdman along the west and south side of the canyon and which will join the diagonal road from Hermiston to Cold Springs. W. W. Harrah attended the meeting and states that the majority of owners of land through which the road will go were in favor of giving the right of way and the majority signed the necessary papers which were prepared by the engineers. The meeting began in the morning and continued through the afternoon, with a dinner served at noon.

Valuable Barn Burned. A heavy loss was suffered last night on the Olney Simpson farm in the Despain gulch when a big barn burned to the ground. There was no insurance on either barn or contents, and all the equipment, some grain and feed were consumed in the fire. Twenty head of mules were stabled for the night in the barn, and only eight of them were saved. The fire was discovered about midnight by one of the boys at the house who thought the light he saw came from an automobile headlight. Jesse Vaughn, who farms the place, suffered painful wounds in his efforts to free the livestock. He was burned on the face, hands and arms.

Contracts Are Signed. About 2100 acres of hay have been contracted for under the marketing agreement of the recently formed Oregon Cooperative Hay Growers' Association and it is expected that Boardman and Irrigon growers will each sign up for 1000 acres, more than reaching the necessary total of 4000 acres which must be secured before the contracts are binding, says Fred Bennion, county agriculture agent. Meetings are being held in Boardman and Irrigon today to get signers to the agreement. The 2100 acres is signed by 60 growers of Umatilla and Morrow counties. No charges are made in the agreement against hay consumed locally which indicates that the policy of the organization is not to hold up the price of alfalfa. The contract is a three year one.
