## COLORED FIGHTER TRAINS IN EFFORT TO REGAIN HONORS

**'Denver Ed' Martin Who Fought  
Before King Edward in 1900  
Thinks He Can 'Come Back.'**

PORTLAND, Or., May 7.—(U. P.)—"Denver Ed" Martin, former contender for the world's heavyweight title, is in the northwest preparing himself for a comeback in the rosin ring. In certain never-to-be-forgotten days of the ring game, the big colored fighter was a lion in his class. He fought before the crowned heads of Europe, and won the championship of England in 1900, during the coronation of King Edward, by knocking out "Sandy" Ferguson. Martin is now doing double time on the road, and working morning and afternoon with the gloves. He has a reach of 83 inches, stands six feet four in stocking feet and weighs 234 pounds. So at the age of 43, "Denver Ed" Martin expects to climb still higher on the pugilistic ladder before the final song rings on his career.

**ZBYNSKO THROWS LEWIS**  
NEW YORK, May 7.—(A. P.)—Stanislaus Zbyszko of Poland, won the world's heavyweight catch-as-catch-can wrestling championship here last night by defeating Ed (Strangler) Lewis of San Jose, Cal., with a neck lock after 23 minutes of wrestling. After several minutes of strenuous grappling, Lewis tried for his famous head lock and missed, falling on his back. The Pole quickly pounced upon him and pinned his shoulders to the mat. Zbyszko weighed 225 pounds and Lewis 235.
