Automobile tires are now below the pre-war prices, say dealers, who state that since the drop in price the tires are two percent below the old price. A 20 percent decrease in practically all kinds of tires took place May 2.

Strawberry Crop Good

The Milton-Freewater strawberry crop gives promise of being very good and a plentiful supply is expected, says Fred Bennion, county agent. The berries will probably be ready for market by June 1 and will be the first county-grown fruit of this season. There is a larger acreage than usual this year, Mr. Bennion states.

Mrs. Edith G. Van Deusen, home demonstration agent, and Miss Lassie Lane, nutrition specialist from O. A. C., are in Pilot Rock today to conduct children's conferences. The conference will be the third in a series, the others having been held at Weston and Hermiston. Umatilla county women are showing much interest in the conferences, Mrs. Van Deusen states.

Weeds Under Control.

Because of the unusually good stand of wheat this season, Umatilla county fields are remarkably free from weeds, say farmers. With the exception of some fields which were plowed late last year, the fields are fairly clean of weeds and show the good results of early plowing. The wheat is so thick and is stooled out to such an extent that there will be need of June rains to prevent burning, farmers declare.

Golf Club to Meet.

To determine what part Pendleton golfers shall take in a proposed five-team tournament to be held here May 25 and 26 will be decided this evening when a meeting of Golf Club members is to be held at the Commercial Association rooms. The meet as proposed will include the clubs from Lewiston, Yakima, Walla Walla, Baker and Pendleton. A full attendance is desired at the meeting.

Pilot Rock Man High.

In the track and field meet held here Saturday, the town of Pilot Rock did not win the meet but it produced two men who were high in the scoring for their school. With slight training, the school was represented by the high individual, V. Bracher made the highest score in the meet when he rolled up 16. Al Warner of Pendleton was second with 15 and third place went to Jordan, also of Pilot Rock who got 14.

Captain Escaped Prisoner

John France who yesterday quietly walked away from the county jail was located today by Deputy Sheriff's Rigby and Spears who acted on a tip and searched a country house two miles east of the city. They finally found the man in hiding under a bed. He was brought back to jail and placed in the dungeon where he will be kept on a light menu for ten days.
