INCE "FIND" IS NEW FILM

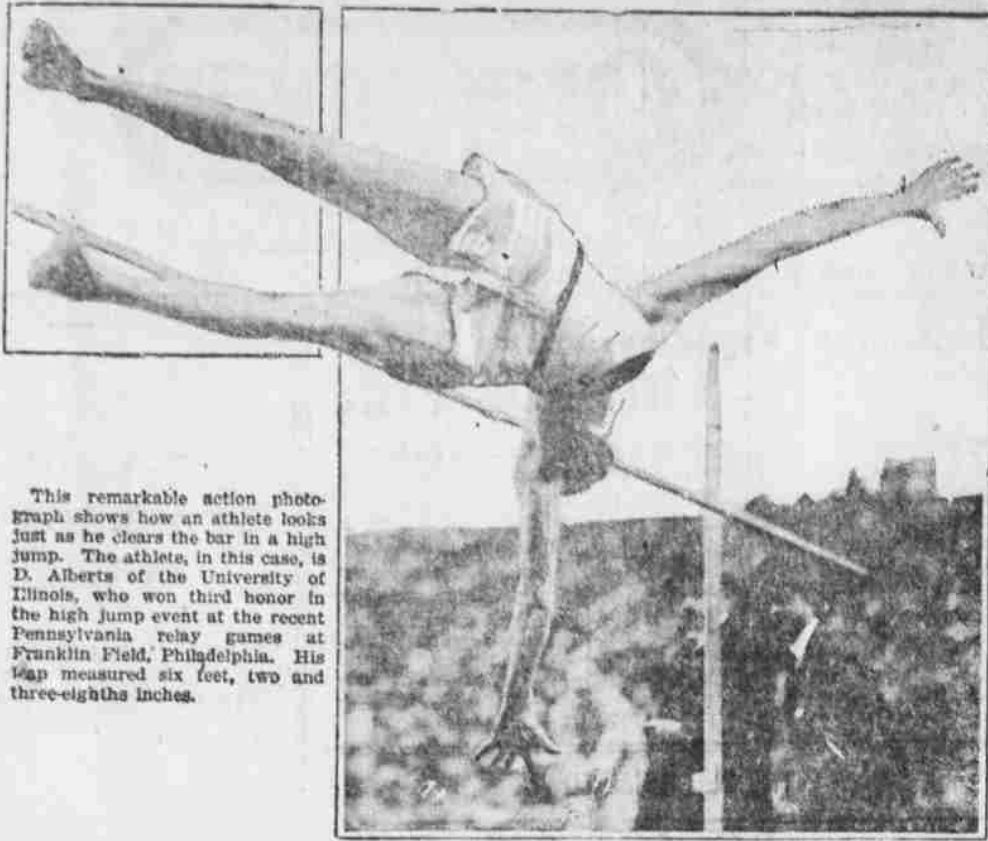

SINN FEIN HAS HARD TASK GETTING ARMS

LONDON, May 11.—(Austin West, U. P. Staff Correspondent.)—One of the main supports of the Sinn Fein campaign in Ireland are being swept away by the government forces. For a long time the Sinn Feiners found it comparatively easy to smuggle war equipment into the country, but the gradual acquisition of control of all ports and systematic searching of ships has made it increasingly difficult to obtain fresh supplies. Even the smuggling out of the country of wanted men, dispatches and anti-British propaganda has been reduced to a minimum. The task of defeating Sinn Feiners

In this manner is in the hands of the Auxiliary Division of the R. I. C. AMERICANS FIGHT HARD FOR BRAZILIAN TRADE

RIO DE JANEIRO, May 11.—(By Miles W. Vaughn, U. P. Staff Correspondent.)—The ability of American manufacturers to hold an export trade which was being built up during the war probably is receiving more severe test in Brazil today than in any other nation of the world.

And taken by small and large, the American business man has little to be ashamed of in his record. Scores of American business houses now are fighting against the greatest odds to maintain their position, and it is to eternal credit that most of them are making good, despite obstacles.

The automobile trade offers an excellent example. During the war, and the months immediately following the signing of the armistice, practically every American manufacturer of importance established branch houses in Brazil. Business came almost without effort, for Brazil, like the United States, was enjoying a period of undreamed of prosperity.

About eight months ago, however, "the bottom fell out of the market." The mills started a gradual decline which today has reached fifty per cent of its wartime value. In comparison with the dollar, thus an automobile which could be sold for four cantos of reis on January 1, 1920, today must be sold for approximately eight cantos to bring the same amount of dollars to the seller.

One big Detroit manufacturer, who was selling an average of 50 cars a month in Brazil during the latter months of 1919 and the beginning of 1920, today admits that it is requiring five times as much effort to sell three machines a month.

"But we're not giving up," he declares. "We are increasing our advertising, keeping practically all of our salesmen and fighting for business. Within 12 months we hope—and expect—to beat our average monthly sales for 1919."

Practically all the new automobiles one sees on the streets of Rio and Sao Paulo—the two most important cities of Brazil—are of American manufacture. The American dealers, despite bitter competition from British, French, Belgian and Italian firms, are selling more than their share of machines and proving that the "high-price-of-the-dollar" argument is not as serious an obstacle as many European salesmen would like to make their customers believe.

Some firms, who were largely overstocked when the present financial crisis started, have been reshipping to Mexico, where they declare there is a ready market for American-made cars, especially in the Tampico district.

AIR PLANES BRING GEMS FROM BELGIAN CONGO

LONDON, May 11.—(A. P.)—Aerial transport of diamonds is contemplated in the Belgian Congo by a mining company in which American interests are largely represented, according to African advices received here. The mines concerned are at Djoko-Punda, in the Kasai Province. At present the journey by boat along the Kasai and Congo rivers between the mines and Kinshasa, a distance of 500 miles, occupies 35 to 40 days. By the use of airplanes, it is expected to accomplish the trip in about two days. The present output of diamonds from the Kasai fields is reported to be 250,000 carats a year. Exploitation of the fields began in 1908.

ATHENS, May 9.—(A. P.)—Princess Anastasia, the American wife of Prince Christopher who was formerly Mrs. William B. 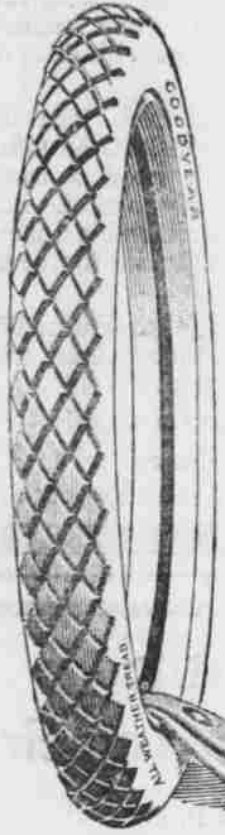
