Pioneer Visits Here
 Clark Walter, one of the pioneers of Umatilla county, and closely connected with development of the county and community in the early days, is here today visiting with old friends. Mr. Walter was one of the county commissioners at the time forty years ago when the courthouse site fight was waged which resulted in the erection of the present building. J. M. Bentley was sheriff of the county at that time, and he and Mr. Walter both favored moving the county building from the old location, which was on the ground now occupied by Alexanders. Times are better now than they were a good many years ago when he farmed extensively here, Mr. Walters declares. One year when there was a heavy precipitation he sold wheat for 18 cents a bushel, but another time he sold good wheat for 41 cents. While here he called on J. M. Bentley. His home now is in Walla Walla, but he retains land in Umatilla county.
