 Philip Jackson, son of Mr. and Mrs. C. S. Jackson of Portland and well known in Pendleton, who has been spending several weeks in New York, sailed last week for Europe on the steamship Mauretania. He will be gone about a month, spending much of the time in London and Paris. He sailed in company with W. W. Hawkins, president of the United Front.

Northern Lights Seen
 The Northern Lights were again visible Saturday evening in Pendleton and afforded a fine exhibition of the phenomenon. The lights illuminated the entire sky in colors of green, gold, blue, pink and violet and the sight was one of great beauty.

Rainfall is 20
 The rainfall yesterday and last night totaled 1.20 of an inch and more will probably follow, says Major Lee Moorhouse, official weather observer. The maximum today is 68, the minimum 49 and the barometer registers 29.52.

 The river is not a best-rate place to fish right now, according to the opinion expressed by local anglers. The snow is melting in the mountains and, in its upper stretches, the water is muddy. It is still milky when the water reaches Pendleton. Moscham is a good fishing place right now, and the smaller streams are yielding the big catches. Sol Baum thinks the river will not be good for three or four days.

Miss Schurpf Chosen
 Miss Alma Schurpf, of Portland, sister of L. C. Schurpf of this city, was elected secretary of the student body at O. A. C. at the election on Saturday, winning over her opponent by 243 votes. Miss Schurpf, with an average of 91 for her three years, has taken the Clara H. Waldo scholarship prize for two years in succession. She is a member of Fortium, all-school economic society; Omicron Nu, home economics honorary; Muak and Degree, dramatic society and of Kappa Alpha Theta, women's fraternity.

Make Building Applications
 Two applications for building permits were made Saturday at the office of city engineer Thomas Fitz Gerald. One was for repairing and cementing of a basement of the residence of Kenneth McKee at an estimated cost of \$200. The other was for the construction of a service station by Billinger and Parlor on East Court street. The main part of the building is to be 16 by 18 feet with a full basement and a 25 by 16 foot porch. Brick tile and wood will be used in construction of the building, which will cost \$1200.

 Mrs. O. S. Shirley, of Portland, the victim of an auto accident in Portland recently and whose death occurred yesterday, was a sister of A. J. Owen of this city, and had often visited in Pendleton during the Round-Up. Mr. Owen left yesterday to attend the funeral services. Mrs. Shirley, who was 62 years old is survived by her husband and two daughters. Mrs. Shirley received a fracture at the base of the skull when she was struck by an automobile delivery truck driven by Ben Troutlet. She was crossing the street intersection at the time. Troutlet is alleged to have passed another machine at the intersection in violation of the traffic laws. He is now held under bond. It was announced at the coroner's office that an inquest into the accident will be held either tonight or tomorrow in order to fix the responsibility.

Milk Served in Bottles

Several local restaurants have adopted the system of serving milk in bottles instead of in glasses. The new plan was adopted so that the milk can be served direct from the creamery to the patron, which restaurant proprietors say is more sanitary than the old way and which is also a time saver.

Playground Specialist Coming

Through the combined efforts of the Commercial Association and the summer normal, Dr. Henry D. Curtis of Oberlin college, formerly secretary of the Playground Association of America, and of the National Child Welfare association, and author of a number of authoritative books on the subject of recreation, has been secured to speak in Pendleton June 28 to 29. During his visit he will make addresses before the normal school, and it is probable that he will be asked to address some civic bodies. A survey of recreational opportunities in Pendleton will be made by the noted educator during his visit.
