PENDLETON HIGH SCHOOL TRACK MEN WIN CHAMPIONSHIP OF THIS DISTRICT IN SATURDAY'S MEET

Locals Get Eight Firsts and Tie for Another and Roll Up 66 1/2 Points; Baker Second.

By taking eight firsts out of 13 events and tying for first in the ninth, Pendleton high school's athletes won the championship of Eastern Oregon at the dual meet held at Union Saturday. Hanley's boys' through home 55.1-2 points against 22 for Baker, 29 for La Grande, Union 15; Joseph 8; Wallowa 7; Pilot Rock 5.3-2, and Enterprise 2.

ten of La Grande. In the high hurdles Pendleton emerged from a contest with a tie for second. In the high jump J. Saunders and Laffey tied for first at 5 feet 4 inches. They passed until the bar was one inch above the five foot mark, and were not pressed to win.

The 300 run furnished about as many thrills as any event of the day. Barnhart started at third place, moved to second after the first 200 yards and held his place until the last 100 yards when he sprinted and broke the tape ahead of the field. Tyson of La Grande, last year's winner, who was sixth until near the finish took a spring and nosed Dick Lawrence out of second honors by a measly two inches.

The relay was won by Pendleton after hard luck in two respects. Snyder who led off for the locals drew the events, or outside, but his zoned on the start enabled him to win the pole on his distance. Fully three seconds were lost by him in finding his man, but at the locals were 25 feet ahead of La Grande who took second honors, and... or Union who placed third.

RICH PRIZE PROPOSED FOR WINNER OF SHOOT AT YAKIMA DURING MAY

Twenty-five Entries Already in Lists With Many More Showing Interest in 3-day Event.

"Twenty-five entries have already been assured for 'The Yakima Hundred'" says G. A. Conklin of Yakima, Washington, Tournament Manager of the Washington State Trapsnooting Tournament for 1921, but from the number of inquiries received from Eastern and Southern points, it appears as though the list may reach forty or fifty by the time entries close at noon May 25th.

"The Yakima Hundred" is a special, 16-yard event of 10 targets, \$100 entrance per man, and will be shot in connection with the State Tournament of Yakima, the regular tournament dates being May 28th, 29th, and 30th. The purse is divided percentage plan, 20 or more entries, five monies, 35, 25, 20, 12 and 8 per cent.

"With thirty entries," Conklin says, "the winner will receive in cash at least \$1,000, which is more than the winner of the Grand American Handicap will draw down. If forty entries are secured, the winner's portion will be \$1,400. We added the special match in an endeavor to make this year's tournament noteworthy in the annals of Pacific Coast trapsnooting, and to try and break all attendance records for a Western Trapsnooting contest. The advance reports certainly indicate that we are going to make good and that trapsnooters will attend a match race of this character."

On Saturday, May 25th, one hundred 16-yard targetry will be shot, divided into four, 25-target events, entrance \$4.00 each event, with \$100 added money. The purse division in these events will be percentage 40, 20, 20 and 10 percent. Twenty-five pairs of double targets will also be shot on this day, entrance \$5.00, money division percentage 40, 20, 20 and 10 percent.

On Sunday, May 29th, the program calls for one hundred and fifty 16-yard targets under the Spire money-back system, entrance \$18.00 and \$12.00 added, the last hundred constituting the first hundred of the State Championship. The State Handicap Championship, consisting of 100 targets will be shot, fifty targets Sunday and fifty targets Monday, entrance \$12.50 with \$100 added. The Yakima Gun Club guarantees the winner of the Handicap, at least \$100.00, money division in the handicap to be high gun system, one money for each three entries.

On Monday, one hundred fifty 16-yard targets are to be shot, Spire money-back system, entrance \$18.00 with \$150 added and the state handicap championship finished. Immediately following the conclusion of the Singles Championship, contestants in the "Yakima Hundred" will be called to the firing line and motion pictures of sounds and prominent individuals in the race will be taken by Pathé News Service.

More than 600 programs have been mailed to trapsnooters scattered all over the United States, as well as special invitations to prominent trapsnooters," Conklin concludes, "and our tournament promises to attract the greatest galaxy of shooting stars ever gathered together in the West. With the exceptions of F. M. Troch and P. H. O'Brien, 'The Yakima Hundred' is open to any amateur contestant in the United States and Canada.

Portlets have been posted by Dr. C. L. Tompkins, R. S. Seale and Matt Plessman of Seattle, Dr. A. S. Christoph of Yakima and for one other Yakima entry to be later selected.
