crop reports from central Kansas failed to hold because of lack of adequate outside buying power rather than any conspicuous selling. Despite the late decline the evidence today was more convincing than ever that wheat is gradually working into a stronger position. Stocks of wheat at terminals are down to the minimum, and conceded that supplies of flour in this country are at a low ebb. Foreigners so far have been able to buy wheat with comparative ease because the domestic consumer, imbued with the idea of lower prices has bought sparingly. Prices are now at a level where it is reasonable to assume that trade interests encouraged by the improvement in financial conditions will enter the market as buyers. Under present conditions a situation of this sort could find reflection in higher prices with crop uncertainty serving as an incentive.
