### NO FUNDS AVAILABLE.

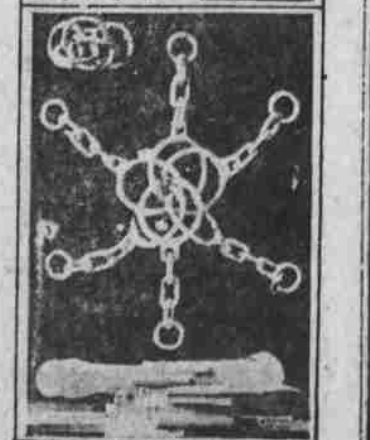

## CHINA AND GERMANY TRY TO FORM TREATY

BERLIN, May 18.—(A. P.)—China and Germany are apparently no closer to an actual restoration of diplomatic relations than they were six months ago in spite of the fact that unofficial delegations are at work in both countries trying to perfect a treaty.

Herr von Borch heads the German delegation which is working in Peking and Dr. Chang is chairman of the Chinese delegation which is living at the Chinese legation in Berlin. Although China passed a resolution declaring it was at peace with Germany, following the refusal of the Chinese to sign the Versailles treaty because of the disposition made of Shantung province, the Chinese government has not yet abrogated its leg-

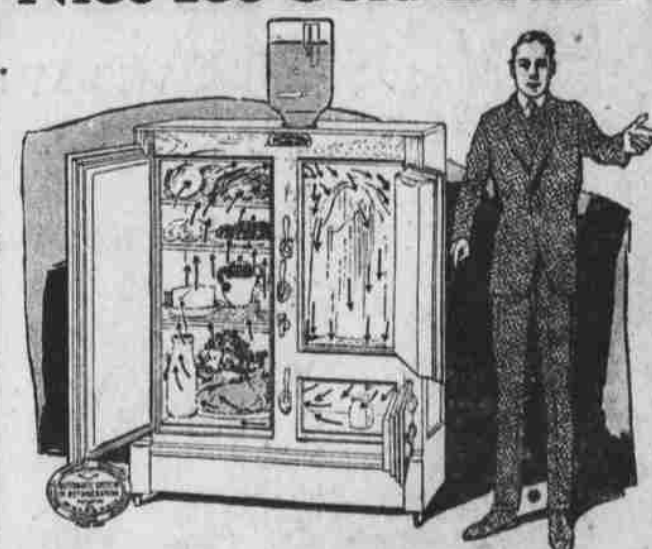
