Cruel and inhuman treatment is the basis of a suit for divorce filed today in circuit court by James B. Swift against Jessie C. Swift. WEALTHY SLACKER'S ATTORNEY TESTIFIES

WASHINGTON, May 19.—(A. P.)—Facing trial by the house on five charges of contempt for refusing to testify before one of its committees, Harry Weinberger of New York, former counsel for Grover Bergdoll, the slacker, turned about suddenly yesterday and announced he had decided to answer questions.

This action ended contempt proceedings, but committee members said his testimony was relatively of no value in the task of trying to fix responsibility for Bergdoll's escape.

When he decided to answer questions, the witness testified that he got \$5000 in fees and paid none of it to other lawyers. "He knew nothing, he said, about the buried gold."

WASHINGTON DIVORCE LAWS ARE DISCUSSED

SPOKANE, May 19.—(A. P.)—Divorce and marriage laws of the state of Washington were attacked on the floor of the convention of the Episcopal district of Spokane here yesterday.

"Western states appear to be engaged in a horrible race to see which can produce the greatest number of divorces," declared Bishop Page. "The problem is a religious one and must be dealt with by the Episcopal church. It is a woman's problem."

Rev. C. A. Braden of Grand View said that Yakima county had more divorces than New York.

A series of resolutions was drafted favoring the passage of new marriage and divorce laws and urging personal interest in the question of Episcopalians.

CONGRESS WOULD ASK GREAT BRITAIN AND JAPAN TO CONFERENCE

CHICAGO, May 19.—(A. P.)—Congress on the reduction of armaments adopted a resolution urging President Harding to invite Great Britain and Japan to an immediate conference on limitation of naval armaments.

DOLLA, Mo., May 19.—J. G. Hines, engineer of a St. Louis, San Francisco passenger train, fell dead at the throttle today. The train was en route to St. Louis from the west, traveling at about 30 miles an hour, but was stopped by the fireman.
