Marriage License.

Letters of administration have been issued to George A. Price for the estate of Harlow T. Foster; to Mar. Dyer Depew to administer the estate of Michael McCracken; and to Edith L. Moss for the estate of Clyde A. Moss.

To Get Delivery of Deed.
A suit has been instituted in circuit court by Ivi Chatas and Frank Chatas against P. N. Robinson and Martha Robinson and J. S. Johns in which the plaintiffs seek to have deed to certain real estate delivered. Fox & Fox are the plaintiffs' attorneys.

City Names Defendants.
A motion has been filed in circuit court by H. J. Warner as attorney for the city of Pendleton in which it is asked that Al Turner, Dean Shull, Eugene Blanchett, Ledford Conger, F. P. Bruce, Bruce Cook and Benj. P. Courtney be named as additional defendants in the case of the municipality against the claimants for the reward offered for the capture of the men who broke jail and murdered Till Taylor last July.

Bound to Federal Grand Jury.
Herman Bohr, better known as "Spokane Whites" and Leo Chung and Jim Chong, Chinamen, were arraigned in federal court this morning before Commissioner S. A. Newberry on charges of having drugs in their possession illegally. They waived examination and were bound over to await the action of the federal grand jury. F. F. Pace, deputy United States marshal had charge of the men. He will return from La Grande Monday and expects to take the men to Portland where they will be held pending their examination.

DEPOSITS REMAIN STATIONARY.
VIENNA, May 21.—(A. P.)—Bank deposits here have remained virtually stationary for three months, thus forcing the banks to resort to emergency measures to meet demands of large depositors for payrolls and similar purposes. They are depositing securities with the government and having money printed to order.

The curious situation is ascribed principally to the law governing depositors, which requires a complete identification of the individual. Many persons object to this, not wishing to disclose their assets for taxation and preferring to have many small bank accounts under different names. The bankers have asked for the repeal of the law.

Another explanation is that there is so little faith in the Austrian crown that the people spend it as fast as they get it for something of tangible value.
