## POLO PONIES MOST IMPORTANT FACTOR IN WINNING GAMES

### Americans Who Meet British Soon Have One Wise Horse Who is Just 22 Years Old.

LONDON, May 21.—(Chas. McCann, U. P. Staff Correspondent.)—Polo experts readily concede that the pony is quite the most important factor in the game, and that however fine the horsemanship and play of the rider, a badly-trained polo pony will ruin any team's chances of victory.

Bearing this in mind, the United Press went to interview the American ponies, and was even more impressed by these equine aristocrats than by the jolly but modest little band of sportsmen fighting under Captain Devereux Milburn's Star-Spangled Banner for the international polo cup.

While the mere humans play under the tuition of Milburn the fifty ponies comprising the string under H. V. Colt's charge, play under the guidance of Tenby, Milburn's favorite mount. Tenby is a nearly-black veteran, twenty-two years of age, he was a member of Harry Payne Whitney's victorious invading team which won the Polo cup over here as far back as 1908. He also played in all the international matches of 1911, 1912, 1914, at Meadowbrook, L. I., and what Tenby doesn't know about polo isn't worth learning.

It is his knowledge of the game that enables Tenby to remain the star performer at an age when most horses are regarded as too old for ordinary work, quite apart from the strenuous life of a polo pony. Ponies new to the game get excited and take a tremendous amount out of themselves, but the wise ones like Tenby know better. They conserve their strength, and watching the game as closely as their rider, know exactly when and where to move.

A hurricane attack by an opposing No. 2 doesn't worry Tenby. He stays off the most persistent obstructive tactics of the rival No. 1 almost without the touch of Milburn's guiding legs, and he knows immediately whether it will be necessary for Milburn to take a hand.

Unfortunately, even a Tenby cannot stand the strain of a whole match, and Milburn nurses his favorite, generally using him for the most critical "chukker," when brain work is required. His moral influence on the other animals, however, is tremendous whether playing or standing by. The average polo pony goes wild at the sight of a ball on the run and must forever be trying to intercept it. But seeing a veteran like Tenby standing unmoved by the proximity of charging animals or rolling balls, he realizes the futility of over-zealousness.

Tenby readily acted as host to the United Press and introduced a few of the stars. There was Iola, a modest little light-brown mare, wise to the work of No. 1; Peroxide, a flashy looking chestnut with a white streaked face, frisky and high-spirited and burning to make every run by No. 2, a scoring effort; Pezzy, Lucky Strike, Aunt Agie, Speed, Naughty Girl, Guineas, Miss Jacob—their names are all to be found painted on the doors of the boxes in King George's best paddocks at Hampton Court, although the animals have since moved to Hurlingham.

### PENINSULA COMPANY TO BUILD \$750,000 PLANT

PORTLAND, May 21.—Construction of an entire new mill for the exclusive sawing of high grade logs, with independent dry kiln and planing-mill capacity, and the utilization of the present mill for handling timbers for the domestic and offshore markets, was announced yesterday by the Peninsula Lumber company. Actual building will be undertaken as soon as a fill, under way on the north side of the site has settled sufficiently to permit the structures being begun. It is estimated the cost will be close to \$750,000. When in full operation payroll expenditures will be about doubled, reaching \$1,000,000 annually.

### CHIEF JUSTICE WHITE LAID TO REST TODAY

WASHINGTON, May 21.—(A. P.)—The wheels of government swung to rest in Washington last night to stand idle until last honors have been paid today to the memory of Edward Douglas White, chief justice of the United States.

Under presidential order the executive departments were to remain closed all day; lesser courts also were at a standstill and the senate adjourned until Monday. The house alone was to be in session after the funeral, driven by the urgent requirements of public business, having already suspended for a day in honor of the dead.

While the wishes of the family were for simple, private ceremonies, the great place Justice White held as head of one of the three coordinate branches of the American government forbade abandonment of all official part in the mourning.

### Burial Service at Georgetown

After services at St. Matthews church the body will be carried to Oakhill cemetery in Georgetown for burial, accompanied by the eight surviving members of the greatest legal tribunal as honorary pallbearers by Vice-President Coolidge and a select verate committee, Speaker Gillett and leaders of majority and minority in the house and the full delegation in congress from the chief justice's native state of Louisiana.

### All Flags at Half Mast

President Harding expected to attend as well as cabinet members and ranking officials of all the government departments.

The stream of messages attesting Justice White's high place in the legal fraternity continued today to pour into the supreme court.

At the house, too, messages of sympathy piled up through the hours from every part of the world.

At last arrangements for the funeral were completed, the president's orders were speeding over the world by cable to bring to half mast for 30 days flags that fly over American diplomatic and consular missions. Already similar orders had been flashed to army and navy posts and the navy ships at sea and with these went instructions that a funeral salute of 17 guns should boom out at the funeral home.
