NEW YORK, May 23.—(A. P.)—The steamship owners' association declined Secretary Davis' proposals for the settlement of the strike.

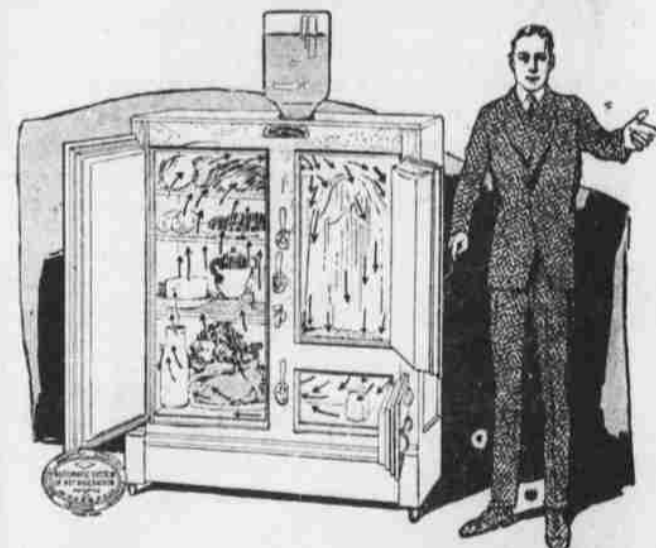
British Soldiers go to Silesia.
