Cattle On Order and Hogs and Lambs Firm.
(From the Oregon Journal.)
Afternoon sales at the North Portland stockyards showed a further decline in cattle prices of 25 cents in the whole division, making the market for the day 15c and 17c lower.
Only 47 cars of livestock came to North Portland over Sunday compared with 50 cars a week ago and 101 cars a year ago. Hogs were firmer and higher, steers showed a loss of 50c, while there was a display of strength for lambs.
In the cattle alleys there was a continuation of the trade weakness from the previous six days. Early movement of steers in the North Portland alleys was at a general reduction of 50c. No change in early cow prices was shown, there being only a very limited amount of real good stuff

in sight and this stimulated the demand for the stuff. Bulls and calves were also inclined to rule steady at the week's opening.

With a run of but 317 head, compared with the nominal showing of 757 last Monday, the market responded to the changed conditions and an early advance of 25c generally was scored in values.
