



oaned during the big expansion period hat began in 1890. It was represented by stocks in mines, railroads and man-ifactoring plants. It paid more than 150,000,000 a year to the foreign own-rs in interest charges and in divilends. Soon after the war, Europe began to find herself badly in need o

enormous credits in the U.S. Grad-ally, the \$2,000,000,000 came back to his country to help pay Europe's rap-idly mounting debt here. Soon the credit was exhausted. The United

States had earned enough to buy back all the foreign interests in domestic ndustry Then the United States began to oan. At first the loans were counted n millions. Now the total is approximately \$2,000,000,000, or almost pre-cisely the amount which the United States formerly owned European in vestors.

This great total of American investents abroad is in addition to about \$13,000,000,000 loaned to foreign govruments by this government, in \$10, 100,000,000 worth of direct war loans and about \$2,500,000,000 credit on surhis war and navy materials.

#### WHEAT OUTLOOK GOOD

HELENA, Mont., May 24-(A. P. -An increase of more then 300,000 bushels of winter wheat is forecast for the 1921 crop in Montana as compared with last season, in the monthly report for May 1 of Fred W. Beler, local statistician of the bureau of crug estimates of the federal department o agriculture. The crop forecasted fo 1921 is 4,233,000 boshels on 249,000 acres, as compared with 3,900,000 bushels last year, harvested from 200,no acres.

A loss of 21 per cent of the acre nge seeded last fall has been lost, the report states, due largely to the dry condition last fall and lack of mois ture during the winter, soil blowing and some freezing. Cut worms and other insects have done some damage this spring. a cortoes in the state wintered in

fine shape, the report indicates, and the lamb and calf crops will be large. "Itering and seeding are said to be well advanced, due to favorable conditions this spring. Rye promises good crop, the report declares, hay starting nicely, with prospects of good crop to supplement the large su plus carried over the winter. Pa Pas tures and ranges are said to od ahape.


