### WILSONVILLE STORE DESTROYED BY FIRE INVESTIGATION MADE

WILSONVILLE, Ore., May 24.—(U. P.)—The farmers' mercantile store, owned by Sam Dreyer, of Portland, was destroyed by fire which, according to H. M. Hossey who discovered it, gave off strong odors of kerosene. The residence of H. D. Aden was also destroyed. The Farmers' Bank building was saved. Citizens have requested the state fire marshal to investigate the cause of the fire.

### PORTLAND GAS AND COKE CO. ORDERED TO CUT THEIR RATE

SALEM, May 25.—(U. P.)—The public service commission ordered the Portland Gas and Coke company to cut their rate 15 cents per 1000 cubic feet, effective June 6. This cut will save the customers \$400,000 annually, it is announced.

## LOBSTER TAKES ITS PLACE WITH BEAN AS COMING FROM BOSTON, 35,000,000 PASSES THROUGH PORT

Adding Prestige as Principal Lobster Market World City Might be Called Lobster Port

BOSTON, May 25.—(A. P.)—If the trend of the times in sea-food were to be followed, the lobster might be bracketed with the sacred codfish as the emblem of this state's fishery. Figures just announced for the last year show that a total of 2,500,000 lobsters came into this port, an average of a thousand a day. By thus adding to its prestige as the principal lobster market of the world, Boston described as the home of the bean and the cod, might be known as the "lobster port."

Steamers from Halifax, N. S. and smacks from ports in Maine and Massachusetts have landed live lobsters here this spring at a rate promising to surpass even the record receipts of last year. In addition canned lobster meat to the extent of six or seven hundred thousand pounds passes through this port.

The lobster grounds, which extend from Nova Scotia to New Jersey, send most of their products here. The bulk of the catch comes from Nova Scotia and Maine. Regardless of the source, the lobsters are subject to the Massachusetts law as to legal length and all "shorts," those measuring less than nine inches from nose to the tail—are sent back to the sea.

The Massachusetts coast in this way profits by lobster immigration from Nova Scotia and Maine to the extent of \$5,000,000 last year. This season, officials of the state fish and

Potatoes to Be Certified—Twenty-one farmers of Weston Mountain have agreed to make efforts to secure certification for seed potatoes. Up to the present time, there has been no potato seed certification although seed from Weston Mountain has been in demand among Yakima valley and and Idaho growers, who, however, paid only table prices for the seed because of no certification guarantee. According to the new plan, the potatoes will be inspected by the State Board of Seed Certification during blossom time and again when the vines die down in the field. Potatoes which pass these tests will be inspected again at harvest time and those which meet requirements will be labeled and sold for seed.

Crop Forecast Given—A crop of 18,000,000 bushels of winter wheat in Oregon in 1921 is forecasted by F. L. Kent agricultural statistician of the U. S. bureau of crop estimates. This forecast is based on an estimated acre remaining for harvest of 712,000 acres and a May 1 condition of 93 per cent. The winter damage to the crop was less than one per cent and spring moisture conditions have been very satisfactory over the greater part of the wheat producing area of the state. The 1920 Oregon winter wheat crop was finally estimated at 17,560 bushels produced on 721,000 acres.
