The clothes worn in the 1860 period of "Milestones," the new Goldwyn picture, which comes to the Arcade theatre for three days, commencing today, were copied from pictures in old copies of the London Illustrated News of that period. They were all made especially for this picture in the designing and dressmaking shops at the Goldwyn studios in California.

High collar collars for the men and hoop skirts for the women characterize the scenes. Some of the women found considerable difficulty with their hoop skirts at first, but Alice Hollister, who plays the part of Gertrude Ithead, was right at home. She had previously acted in pictures calling for hoop skirts.

Miss Hollister is well known to film fans through her admirable work, both abroad and in this country. She returns to the screen in "Milestones," after an absence of two years on account of illness.

PORTLAND, May 27.—(U. P.)—One man is dead and one is dying from drinking a fiery alcoholic concoction offered for sale in the underworld today. Fred W. McCain of Rainier, died in the emergency hospital. An unknown man was picked up unconscious in the "bad lands" from the same drink. The police are searching for the source.

TWO PRINCES TRY TO RECOVER CELEBRATED CHATEAU DE CHAMBORD

Property Was Sequestered by French Government During Late World War.

PARIS, May 27.—(A. P.)—Efforts by two princes of the house of Bourbon-Parma to recover possession of the celebrated Chateau de Chambord, which was sequestered by the French government during the war is one of the interesting aftermaths of the great conflict.

The Chateau is more than 400 years old and is one of the most striking and interesting of the famous feudal establishments of ancient France. It was once one of the most magnificent of these great estates and lies in the valley of the Loire close to the town of Blois and has about 12,000 acres, part of which is enclosed by walls extending for 20 miles. The building is about 290 feet square with famous circular towers at the corners and a double spiral staircase leading to the double lantern, which dominates the center tower.

It was built about 1525 and for two centuries was a royal residence. Louis XV gave it to Marshal Saxe and Napoleon presented it to Marshal Berthier. Eventually it fell into the possession of the Duke of Parma.

At the beginning of the war it was owned by Prince Elias of Bourbon-Parma and was sequestered because he was serving in the Austrian army as an attaché of the Austrian general staff. Prince Elias is a brother of Zita, wife of the former Emperor Charles of Austria-Hungary, who later attempted to regain his throne as king of Hungary.

After the war Prince Elias attempted to recover possession of the chateau but the French courts have just allowed his claim. This, however, does not settle the question of its ownership for Prince Sixtus, also of Bourbon-Parma, brother of Prince Elias has put in a claim to the ownership of the Chateau. Prince Sixtus does not suffer the disability of Prince Elias as Sixtus and his brother Xavier both offered their services to the French government in the war and, being refused on the ground that descendants of the old royal house could not be permitted to fight for France, they both enlisted in the Belgian army where they served as stretcher-bearers under fire, their bravery in this service was afterward recognized in a French citation.

Americans will identify Prince Sixtus as the man who received, while the war was still in progress, the famous letter from Emperor Charles of Austria in which he stated that he sympathized with France's aspirations to recover Alsace-Lorraine and that in his opinion Belgium should be restored by Germany. Prince Sixtus turned the letter over to President Poincaré and its publication by Premier Clemenceau created consternation in Germany. The Emperor Charles denied its authenticity.

REIGN OF TERROR IN CHICAGO'S POLITICS

CHICAGO, May 27.—(U. P.)—Little Italy, Chicago's "bloody nineteenth" ward, was sitting on top of a volcano today.

None of the thousands of residents in the food-torn section of the city are sure of their lives. Death by a bomb or fusillade of shots fired from ambush may be dealt out at any time, without warning. The turbulent history of the nineteenth ward started when Tony d'Andrea, who had studied for the priest-hood in Italy, gave up his career and immigrated to Chicago.

The debonair and scholarly D'Andrea went into the ward and strove for political power. The climax of his stormy career came recently when 15 shots were fired into his body from ambush. He died a few days later.

D'Andrea entered politics in 1914, when he ran for county commissioner. He was defeated. In 1916, for the first time, he contested the seat in city council of Alderman John Powers, who has represented the ward for 25 years.

A bitter campaign followed, during which Frank Lombardi, adherent of the opposing faction, was slain in a saloon.

"Our health," cried his assassins, lifting their glasses.

"Health!" echoed the doomed man. As he raised his glass, guns blazed and he fell behind the bar, shot through the head. D'Andrea lost the election but his power continued to grow.

A few months ago hostilities broke out again, when Powers and D'Andrea were contending in the aldermanic elections.

The home of Powers was bombed. Later, the political headquarters of D'Andrea were wrecked by an infernal machine when 200 of his lieutenants were meeting. Three were seriously injured.

Again D'Andrea was beaten at the polls. The day after election Giacomo Esposito, a Powers voter, was tossed out of a speeding auto in the heart of the ward—his body riddled with bullets. Harry Raymond, a Powers aide, was found murdered the same day.

Then came the murder of Paul Labriola, municipal court deputy bailiff and a Powers lieutenant. He was shot down while going to work.

Threats of reprisals were heard. The shooting of D'Andrea followed.
