PRICE REDUCTIONS WILL BE NECESSARY BEFORE NORMALCY IS REACHED
NEW YORK, May 28.—(U. P.)—Further price reductions may be necessary before normal conditions in the steel industry are restored, Judge Elbert Gary declared in an address before the American Iron and Steel Institute here today. With but few exceptions, he said, it would be unjust to reduce wages further until living costs are brought down. American people at the present are not buying enough to supply themselves with the ordinary comforts of life, Gary declared, although they have means to do so.

DEEP SEA DIVERS HUNT FOR 'MYSTERY TRUNK'
SEATTLE, May 28.—(U. P.)—Deep sea divers, employed by Prosecutor Malcolm Douglas began searching the bottom of Lake Union for the mystery trunk which is believed to contain the secret of the disappearance of Mrs. Kate Mahone.
