BUCKS MAKE IT FIVE STRAIGHT BY LETTING WESTON DOWN WITH 2

Hanley Gets Five Straight Hits in as Many Times up; Locals Grab 12 Hits to 5 Yielded.

In the slowest game that has been played here this year, the Bucks yesterday took another fall out of Weston by a score of 14 to 2, and maintained a perfect team percentage, by making their standing read five games won, none lost.

After the first inning when it became apparent that the visitors had nothing that would make the Bucks extend themselves, the game became a contest in which the locals took slight interest except to see how batting averages would face.
