PROOFS FOR 'LET 'ER BUCK' BOOK ARRIVE

Representing probably the greatest collection of pictures of Western sports ever gathered together, proofs of the 41 illustrations to be used in the Round-Up book, "Let 'er Buck," by Colonel Charles Wellington Furlong, arrived here today.

The pictures are striking examples of the vivid action of the Round-Up and are typical of the great outdoor show. Accompanying them and adding much to their interest are the feature titles which Colonel Furlong has supplied. The captions are particularly western and there are many catch phrases. Thought has been put into the composition of the pictures and the results are excellent.

Cover Picture Is Good.

The illustration for the cover, showing Bill Shafter on 12, is a picture of the title, "Let 'er Buck." Another plate shows Laf. Newman bulldozing, the caption being "Hook 'em Cow." Yak Canutt, in gosh garb, tuckling a big steer, is entitled "The Navy Taking on Fresh Beef." The famous picture of Bonnie McCarroll after her descent from the rear of Silver, is in the collection, as are several pictures of the notorious horse, Long Tom, who has been featured. Lee Caldwell's spectacular ride, made despite a broken arm, is shown, also "The Triumphant Triumvirate of Reiland," Caldwell, Jackson Sundown and Canutt.

Sheriff Taylor Picture.

The late Sheriff T. J. Taylor, astride a horse during the days when he was sheriff of Umatilla county, is the subject for a picture which has caught the valiant spirit of the beloved officer. Also in the picture is W. R. (Jinks) Taylor, who for years has carried the flag in the parade.
