Federal Government Has Dropped Anti-Trust Suit Against American Can Company.

CASE IS GOVERNMENT'S 'TRUST BUSTING' SUIT

Government Failed to Secure Decision in Lower Courts; . . Asked Court Dismiss Appeal.

WASHINGTON, June 6 .- (U. P.) The federal government in the su-prome court has dropped the anti-trust suit against the American Can company. The case is one of the govern-ment's big "trust busting" suits. The government failed to secure a decision in the lower courts, so asked the supreme court to dismiss the appeal, Tax notion was immediately granted.

Hundreds of Miles of Santa Fe Tracks Are Under Water Between Pueblo-Kansas Line.

PUEBLO, June 6 .-- (U. P.)-The flood danger in this city appears over, giving way to the sinister possibility of an epidemic of sickness from the wholesale reversion to primitive san-itation. Colonel Hamroch is calling out additional militia in an effort to meet the disease by concentrating the refugees in camps. Pick and shovel squads are attacking the debris and Colonel Hamroch is threatening to put a shovel in the bands of every able bodied man not otherwise carployed. Though the list of dead is not grow-ing, the authorities fear that many bodies have been washed down stream.
