BUCKAROOS TAKE GAME AND WIN PENNANT IN CONTEST WITH BAD HELIX INDIANS SUNDAY 12 TO 6

Runners-up Outhit Bucks, But Locals Bunch Clouts for Best Effect; Weston Next.

Eight hits garnered off of Gartiez and Kelly, coupled with errors on the part of Helix players enabled Captain Gunner Peterson's Buckaroos to win yesterday's contest with the Indians, and incidentally, the pennant in the Wheat Belt League. The final score was 12 to 6.
