THEY'RE BETTING ON COCKROACH RACES IN CONSTANTINOPLE NOW

Russian Invents Game Where
Plenty of Excitement Can be
Enjoyed; Sports Prevail.

CONSTANTINOPLE, June 8.—(A. P.)—Betting on cockroach races is one of the newest sports here. It was introduced by a Russian who has just opened a hall where a man who wants some real excitement for his money can get results.

The hall is darkened at the moment the race is to begin. Then a single electric light at the end of a runway is turned on, and the cockroaches, such in a separate track, are let loose from their cages to race for the light.

More real, old-fashioned, non-professional sport may be had here than in any other city of Europe. This is due in part to the allied troops of occupation, to the American officers and sailors on station here, and the large number of American and British civilians who have come out for business since the armistice.

What the Russian refugees have done in the way of enlightening the city with concerts, dancing places and queer restaurants, the other allies have done in sporting lines.

In winter there is wild boar, duck and fox hunting. There is also, in and out of season, plenty of horseback riding over the dirt roads and unfenced stretches of upland country on both sides of the Bosphorus. Horse races are often held.

Both the British and the Americans have laid out golf courses. There are also a few tennis courts.

The troops and sailors within the city have taken charge of a large field near Taksim, in the center of Pera and there play football and baseball matches. Yachting and swimming are commonplace sports open to all.

The Russians from the Black Sea, who are accustomed to bathe naked, have increased the popularity of the beaches, especially a fine strip of sand on the Marjama north shore known as Florida. There, without a hindrance, men, women and children, undress on the open beach and bathe in costumes that seem quite conventional here.

The Turks have contributed chicken fights to the international sports.

SACRAMENTO, Cal., June 8.—(A. P.)—Sacramento won the opening game of the series from Salt Lake yesterday, 3 to 0. The Bees were unable to find the offerings of Niehaus and Penner, getting only five hits. Niehaus was removed in the seventh, due to weakness.

MORAN AND MARTIN MATCHED.

This will be Moran's first bout since he returned from England where he knocked out Joe Beckett last December.

GIBBONS WINS OVER MARTIN.
NEW YORK, June 8.—(A. P.)—Mike Gibbons of St. Paul scored a technical knockout over silent Martin of Brooklyn last night when the referee halted their 13-round bout in the 10th round. Martin was punished severely but succeeded in keeping on his feet. He was foggy in the second and eighth rounds also. Gibbons weighed 156 1-4 pounds and Martin 142 3-4.

GEORGES HAS WHITE ONES.
MANHASSET, N. Y., June 8.—(A. P.)—Georges Carpentier, when he steps into the ring at Jersey City on July 2 will wear a white robe with figures of a Japanese design. When he sheds the robe, he will be seen wearing trunks of the same pattern that he has used in all his latest bouts. Pure white they will be with a blue stripe down the sides.

DEMPSEY PLAY SCARDS.
ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., June 8.—Jack Dempsey spends a great share of his idle time around his training camp playing cards for his mental relaxation. Dempsey is virtually a prisoner at his camp, he sees few persons outside of newspaper men and seldom ventures down town.

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GRANDSON OF TOLSTI, FAMOUS RUSSIAN AUTHOR, REFUGEE FROM BOLSHEVIK, FINDS ASYLUM IN ITALY

In 1918 After 3 Days Married
Life He Fled From Moscow,
Lost Track of His Wife.

ROME, June 8.—(A. P.)—Count Elias Tolstol, a grandson of the famous Russian writer, has just arrived here after a journey through China and Japan, having escaped from the Bolsheviki. In 1918, after three days of married life, he had to flee from Moscow because he was condemned to death and now he is in ignorance as to whether his bride is dead or alive.

He joined Admiral Koltchak's forces and fought against the Bolsheviki, was stricken with typhus on three occasions and was nursed in the American hospital at Omsk.

He said that his aunt, Catherine, is in prison at Moscow and another aunt, Tatiana, is a servant of a Bolsheviki family.

Tolstol predicts the sure and inevitable death of Bolshevism, either through demoralization or starvation of the army. The rations of the soldiers, he said, have been reduced to a quarter of a pound of bread and one-eighth of a sausage. He added that Russia could not now-a-days produce even a needle.

MINES ARE REOPENED.
