## COMMERCIAL CLUB OF ECHO HOLDS MEETING

ECHO, June 9.—The commercial club met Monday evening and decided to make several changes in the management of the auto camp grounds. There has been a great deal of complaint about horses being allowed to run at large in the park and travelers seemingly making the place a permanent camp. Signs are now being placed prohibiting the burning of cut wood in the park, prohibiting horses on the grounds, and fixing the time allowed for tourists in the park at 48 hours. The road to the park is also being overhauled and graded.

**Oregon Wool Prices Show Gradual Gain**  
PORTLAND, June 9.—(A. P.)—Somewhat improved situation is indicated in the wool market here and at country points, although there continues more or less bearish sentiment among speculators who are seeking supplies at Pacific Northwest primary points. Some selling is shown at fair prices. There was a lot of 100,000 pounds of Baker and Ellensburg wool that sold at 16c, while an offer for fine wool at Condon was refused at 18c a pound.  
Portland warehouses are securing considerable wool, the Columbia Basin Wool Warehouse company alone reporting nearly 2,000,000 pounds of the 1921 clip already on hand here.  
The Columbia Basin company has recently sold 100,000 pounds of quarter blood at 15c a pound in the grease, a fair price for this period.  
According to officials of the company the outlook for wool prices is somewhat more hopeful, although it is expected that the advance will be moderate and gradual. No runaway values are looked for and the improvement is likely to be the most active during the fall months.  
The Oregon Wool and Mohair association passed the 1000 member mark on June 4, when the total membership amounted to 1018. According to organization manager R. A. Ward, the association is signing up about 1000 sheep a day in Western Oregon.  
The first man to ship wool to the association and also the first man to christen with wool the new western warehouse where the association's wools are being stored, was John W. Strout of Corvallis.  
The association's latest Boston advice indicates that the last few days have brought out considerable buying on the part of the larger mills, at clean costs which figure somewhat lower than previously for territory wools. The government wool auction showed a better clearance of wools than was expected. Bradford, England, reports many mills idle because of the coal strike.
