Wheat—The market made its range for the day during early trading after which irregularly developed dominated by a very mixed news budget. The features was the renewal of liquidation which was so prominent yesterday. All cash markets were weak and lower under the pressure of increased country selling and a rather lethargic demand. Export sales were estimated at half a million bushels, but it was believed to be largely in the nature of covering old sales. Considerable buying of Sept. against sales of July took place based on doubt on the idea that harvesting this year is far enough ahead of normal to insure a good movement from the country during the month of July, while the September will be strengthened by any mid crop reports from the spring wheat territory. The weather in the southwest will bear watching, as a continuation of present rainy conditions would mean a wet harvest and a delayed movement. With so much depending on the outcome of spring wheat crop we doubt the advisability of taking a position on the short side when the known facts regarding that crop are all favorable and any change would very likely be the worse.

PORTLAND, June 14.—(A. P.)—The rivers are still falling and the forecast is that it will fall for the next three days.
