MAY ORGANIZE D. OF V.

A branch of the Daughters of Veterans may be organized in Pendleton. If enough members can be secured, a meeting is to be held tonight in the county library at 7:30 p. m. For membership a woman must be the daughter of a member of the Grand Army of the Republic.

The Daughters of Veterans chapter nearest to Pendleton is the Portland chapter. The state organization has been in existence for the past year and there are four branches, in Portland, Astoria, Salem and Marshfield with a total of two hundred and fifty members. If a chapter were organized in Pendleton, it would be the first in Eastern Oregon.

Considerable enthusiasm in the Daughters of Veterans organization here is shown by local women, many of whom met the delegates to the D. of V. who were in Pendleton during the Grand Army encampment. It is possible for a woman who is a member of the Ladies of the G. A. R. to join the Daughters of Veterans also, if she is the daughter of a G. A. R. man. A sister wife or other relative, while eligible to the Ladies of the G. A. R., is not eligible as a member of the Daughters of Veterans.

Mrs. Florence M. Sturdivant, president of the Daughters of Veterans, who presided at the recent convention session in Pendleton, said that she and other officers are anxious to form an organization here if the support of Pendleton women is assured.
