SUPERIOR STRATEGY WILL WIN FIGHT FOR CARPENTIER, SAYS EUROPE'S BANTAMWEIGHT CHAMP

Dempsey a Great Actor While He is Winning; Georges Will Furnish Him New Opposition.

PARIS, June 21.—On my last trip to America I saw Jack Dempsey in training and I saw him in one fight. Those who consider him the "ace" of pugilism exaggerate; those who pretend that he is a second-rater are wrong. Certainly Americans imagine that in Dempsey they possess a new Fitzsimmons, but they do not know our French champion very well.

Jack Dempsey is quick, powerful, relatively scientific for a heavyweight and possesses a real punch. It is due to this fact that he has ended most of his battles in one or two rounds. But he has to land the blow in the right place, and if his adversary is quick

and know how to avoid heavy punches Dempsey will find himself in trouble.

I was present when the American fought Bill Brennan and only beat him in the twelfth round. For my part I do not think that Dempsey gave Brennan everything that he had. My impression was that he felt sure of the victory and prolonged the bout purposely. Throughout the fight he seemed to avoid taking the initiative, Brennan had some impressive returns that obliged Dempsey to make a certain amount of effort. I noticed that in this fight and in Dempsey's training that he sometimes finds himself in difficulties. He is wonderful to see when he is winning, but when he finds himself opposed by a man who offers some resistance he seems to lose spirit. This is why I am certain Carpentier will defeat him.

Battling Levinsky, who has fought both men, told me this: "There is the greatest difference between the quick blows of Carpentier and the blows of Dempsey. I am going to bet every cent I have on Carpentier and I am sure he will win." And if Carpentier wins, it remains for him to meet an extraordinary specimen of the colored race, Harry Wills, whom Dempsey has thus far refused to meet.

PASADENA ALL SET TO ENTERTAIN 200 ATHLETES AT MEET

Best Track and Field Men in Country to Compete July 2, 4, 5 for Championships.

PASADENA, Cal., June 21.—With more than two hundred of the nation's best athletes already entered, the National A. A. U. Championships to be held here at Paddock Field, Tournament Park, under the auspices of the Tournament of Roses July 2, 4 and 5, are expected to attract interest in every section of the world where athletics are popular.

The championships will be divided into the junior track and field events, July 2; senior track and field events, July 4; and the all-around events and relays on July 5. The various contests will all be held on the afternoons of the days scheduled.

One of the rules of the A. A. U. provides: "The annual track and field championships of the Amateur Athletic Union shall consist of a senior class and a junior class. The senior class shall be open to all registered amateur athletes, and the junior class shall be open to any registered amateur athlete who has not won a first place at any track and field or cross-country championship meeting of the Amateur Athletic Union, or of the International Olympic Committee, or of the Intercollegiate Association of Amateur Athletes of America, or of the Intercollegiate Conference Athletic Association, or of the Pacific Coast Intercollegiate Conference or of Canada, Australia, or any foreign country."

The following will be the junior and senior events: 100-yard run, 220-yard run, 440-yard run, 880-yard run, one-mile run, 120-yard hurdle race, 220-yard hurdle race, 440-yard hurdle race, five-mile run, three-mile walk, pole vault for height, running high jump, step and jump; throwing 56-pound hammer, throwing 16-pound hammer, putting 16-pound shot, throwing the discus, throwing the javelin.

Entries Close Late in June

The all-around championship comprises the following events: 100-yard run, putting 16-pound shot, running high jump, 880-yard walk, throwing 16-pound hammer, pole vault for height, 120-yard hurdles (10 flights, 3 feet 6 inches high), throwing 56-pound weight for distance, running broad jump and one-mile run. Also the following relays: 400 yards, teams of four men, each man to run 110 yards; 880 yards, teams of four men, each man to run 220 yards; one mile, teams of four men, each man to run 440 yards; two miles, teams of four men, each man to run 880 yards; four miles, teams of four men, each man to run one mile.

"We are already assured of having more than two hundred of the best Eastern athletes in Pasadena for the championships," said Mr. Weaver. "From New York there will be nine stars from the New York Athletic Club; from the Chicago Athletic Club there will be eleven stars, and the Illinois Athletic Club will have an equal number of athletes, widely known in the Middle West participating."

Honolulu Represented

The Olympic Club of San Francisco will have thirty highly-trained athletes on hand. The Los Angeles Athletic Club will have at least fifty of its best men on the field. From Honolulu will come ten picked athletes, two of these being Chinese. Other cities will have representative delegations entered, and there will be an interesting array of competitions between all sections of the country. Accommodations will be made for from 15,000 to 20,000 spectators. The events, in addition to being of great interest among athletes, will attract society notables of California and the Pacific Coast."

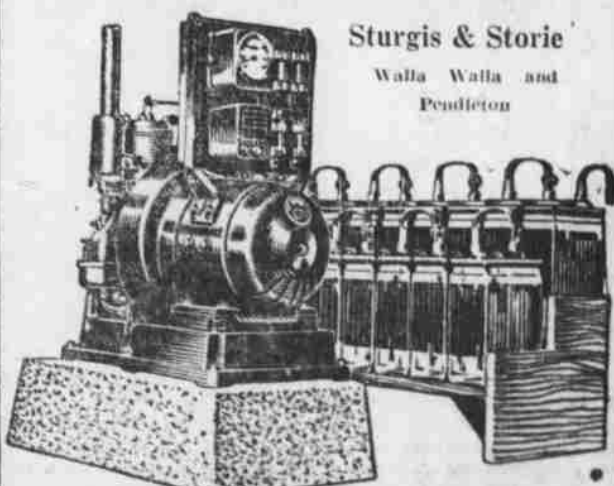
