### BACHELOR ADMIRAL WHO ADOPTED 7 RUSSIAN ORPHANS WRITES RULES OF INSTRUCTION TO GOVERN TRAINING

ANDERSON, S. C., June 23.—(L. N. S.)—The day before the scheduled arrival here of Rear Admiral Newton A. McCully's seven Russian orphans, who were brought from Sebastopol to Washington six months ago and from there to this city where court proceedings were begun to make the chil-

dren full-fledged South Carolinians, a document of instructions by which the conduct of the children is to be governed, and was prepared by Admiral McCully himself, who is a confirmed bachelor.

This document, containing several thousand words, provides work and play for every minute of the children's time, from 7 o'clock in the morning until they retire at 8 o'clock in the evening. Under no conditions must these rules be violated except by permission of the Russian governess or Miss Vina Patrick, a niece of the admiral, who has been in Washington with the children seven months. The day must begin with all sorts of gymnastic exercises to develop their bodies, then a cold bath, when they are ready for breakfast, which consists of cereal, milk and eggs.

There are seldom seen three stronger looking girls than those of twelve years of age. They are the housekeepers in Washington and the admiral expects them to keep up the work while they are with his mother, Mrs. McCully, this summer. They set the table and when the meal is finished may nothing to anybody, but immediately clear the table and if the cook is not there wash the dishes and put them away. A chart is kept in English by Miss Patrick and a chart in Russian by the Russian governess. Each day the children are marked according to the way they have done their duties, by red stars. At the end of the month the one getting the most red stars gets a gold star, which they proudly wear.

Each child also receives a money compensation for the work done.

**Children Are Paid for Work.**  
For one hour a day the Russian governess gives a Russian lesson and for one hour Miss Patrick teaches an English lesson. They are not speaking much English yet, but they understand very readily what is said to them. The children must be in bed by 8 o'clock, lights will be turned off at this time if there is any difficulty about getting the children to turn in. Electric bulbs will be removed and short bits of candle served out. There are prescribed duties for each child and their "titles" are: gardener and furnace man, assistant housekeeper, assistant cook, assistant nurse, first floor maid, second floor maid and messenger. The schedule of monthly pay runs from \$1.50 for the first to 25 cents for the last named. The children may do as they please with the money earned, but each amount deposited by any of them in a savings bank will be doubled by an amount deposited by the admiral to his or her credit. The failure of any child to carry out his day's duties is punishable by stated deductions from the child's pay.

Corporal punishment for any offense is strictly forbidden. In a chapter entitled "honor" appear these instructions: "Tell the truth" and "Take nothing that does not belong to you." Regarding courtesy, the admiral advises his wards: "Try to help others and they will help you." "Be patient and you will get something you want." "Good

manners will be taught by the use of good manners." For the information of the governess, whose duty it is to teach these principles of courtesy, the admiral says, in a sub-heading entitled, "Errors in teaching good manners," this: "Patter a child knows no rule of good manners than a self-conscious child." There will be still time

to teach good manners, but a self-conscious child is past help. A final chapter on "control and training of children" leads off with the platitude that "the child must know that it has a mission in life."

**Adoption Proceedings Scheduled.**  
Under a sub-heading the admiral says: "Aster is human, an angry moment now and then will not do much harm unless the grown-up should say something that would be better left unsaid." "Orders must sometimes be given," says another paragraph, and "before giving an order consider carefully, since an order once given must be followed up until executed or authority will suffer. Choose a quiet moment during which to give the order, use a quiet tone of voice and make sure the child understands an order is to be given but once."

Admiral McCully says that the children are becoming more interesting every day. He has taught them to swim, and they are learning American customs rapidly and they will soon be true South Carolinians. When he looks at them he is thankful that they are here and not starving in Russia, he says. Court proceedings for the adoption of the children will begin in the June term of the court of common pleas, when all seven of the children will legally become the children of Admiral McCully.
