VETERAN SUCCEEDS HIMSELF

Lewis said there was no ill-feeling, no rancor in his mind. "I have used honorable methods. I was not a Hearst candidate and know nothing of the troubles between him and Gompers. I appreciate the progressive note of the convention, which was indicated by the vote for me. I am content with the vote.

The convention will be concluded tonight with the last matters coming up. They probably will complete their work early tomorrow.

Galleries Were Crowded.
DENVER, June 25.—The vote was taken amid a dramatic scene in the auditorium. The galleries were packed by supporters of both factions. The floor of the hall was crowded with spectators. Delegates applauded every announced vote. This was the first time Gompers had been strenuously opposed since 1894, when Minor defeated him for the presidency. Gompers is back in the position for next year. Gompers' triumph is believed to be an endorsement by labor representatives of his administration of cautious methods in preference to the swiftly moving methods of Lewis. The old leader could scarcely control his emotions. He was given a tremendous ovation. The movement toward Gompers assumed an appearance of an avalanche, with Lewis and his own delegation badly split. Lewis got only two-thirds of the miners vote.

The finger was badly mangled and amputation was necessary. Mr. Winn lost his right arm when a child four years of age and it was feared that the recent accident might cause the loss of his other arm. He will leave the hospital on Monday.

Visits Walla Walla District.
R. A. Bottecher, assistant Umatilla forest supervisor, is in the Wenaha division of the forest checking up on the fire fighting equipment and repairing telephone lines. G. L. Keithly, recently transferred to the Walla Walla section from Heppner, will join him today. Two districts in the Heppner region have been consolidated, and for this reason Mr. Keithly was transferred.

Claim Road Is Dangerous.
Parties who have been over the highway between Echo and Nolin recently complain severely of the condition of the highway between Nolin and Echo. In places the road is badly cut up and there is also much danger from the lack of fencing at the short curves. It has been suggested that effort be taken to get the subject before the highway commission with a view to correcting the trouble.

Gorkle Buys Home.
Max Gorkle, proprietor of the Eastern Hide and Junk Co., on his return yesterday from a trip over the eastern part of the state where he has been on a buying tour closed a deal with H. E. Cook for the purchase of a nice new residence at 414 Garfield street. Mr. Gorkle will move his household goods here from Portland, and Pendleton will be his home in the future. Mrs. Gorkle has been here several weeks.

Albers is in Bad State.
That Henry Albers is no longer connected with the Albers Bros. milling company is stated by Frank Chandler, representative of the company who is here today. Mr. Chandler says Albers is completely retired from the business, is nearly blind and otherwise in bad health. Morris Thomson of Little is now head of Albers Bros. In all there are 95 stockholders in the company, asserts Mr. Chandler and a number of these men are overseas veterans, three having been in the Argentine campaign.

Fish Are Thriving.
The million and a half fish recently placed in the hatchery at Bingham Springs are thriving, says Marvin Jack, who as a former member of the state Fish Commission was in charge of the placing of the eggs at the springs. Because only half a million eggs were expected, the quarters were so small that some of the fish smothered. The eggs hatched almost immediately and the fish, says Mr. Jack, will be ready to feed in a few days. In November, after the fall rains, the fish are to be transferred to streams in this county. The Pendleton Rod and Gun Club will cooperate in the work of distribution. Eggs from Elkes Lake are to be brought to Bingham also, Mr. Jack says.
