## HIGHWAY COMMISSION AWARDS HIGHWAY BONDS

PORTLAND, June 29.—(A. P.)—The highway commission awarded a million and a half highway bonds to A. M. Wright and associates, who will pay \$1,500,000 and receive 5 1/4 per cent interest. ## HOME DEMONSTRATION SEASONABLE SUGGESTIONS FOR BUSY HOUSEWIVES

- \* The days of picnics and motor trips call for a variety of sandwiches if the luncheon is to be inviting. The sweet sandwich is a popular dainty and takes the place of cookies or cake.
- \* For the making of sweet sandwiches, it is suggested that the bread be cut thin, the butter creamed and spread evenly; then a marmalade or jelly with a little lemon juice and some chopped nuts, raisins or dates added and used as a filling.
- \* Another sweet filling which is especially good is made by cooking half a cup of brown sugar, one-fourth cup of stemmed and finely chopped figs and one-fourth cup of water to a paste; then add a few drops of lemon juice half a cup of grated coconut or one-fourth cup of chopped peanuts or other nuts. This makes a particularly pleasing sweet sandwich that is good for children. The filling does not soak into the bread as does the marmalade or jelly.
- \* To clean rusty knives thrust the blades into onions and leave for about an hour, then polish them with ordinary powder or bath brick.
