**Fire Smolders a Week.**  
 Sparks of fire that had been smoldering for a week in bales of hay that were in the shed of the Umatilla Flour and Grain when it burned a week ago today were fanned into a blaze this morning that resulted in an alarm being sent in to the fire department. The blaze was extinguished within a

few minutes with practically no loss. The alarm was sounded at 7:45.

**Leave for Chicago.**

 Extensive repair work is being done at the Auto Clearing house, 728 Thompson, and the Roesch Bottling Works on East Court street. The building, one of the oldest in the city, was seriously damaged by fire recently and the repair work was necessary.

**Funeral This Afternoon.**  
 The funeral cortege of the late Owen C. Eckles, who died here last night, left the Folsom Undertaking parlors today at 2:30 p. m. for Echo. Mr. Eckles, who was 66 years of age, is survived by his wife and daughter. Funeral services were held this afternoon in Echo.

Lumber has already been ordered for the new building, and the construction work will be pushed as rapidly as possible in order that grain may be accepted as it is harvested.

Proceedings against the man for his alleged activities in the cutting affray are expected to be handled in federal court.

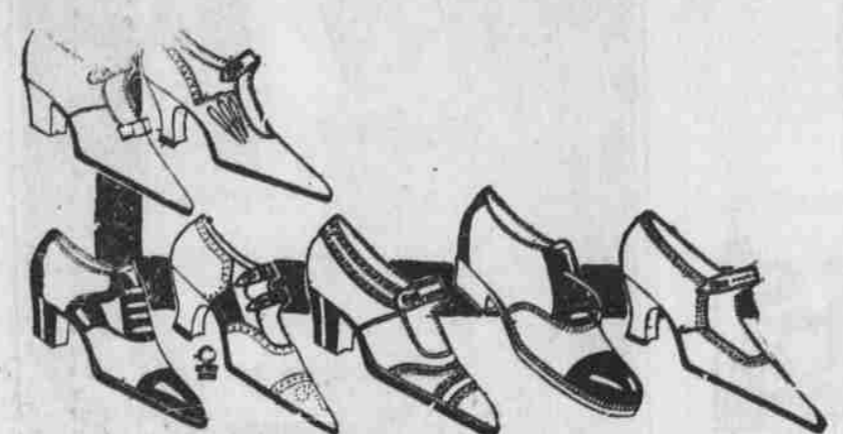
**Rev. Lockwood Chosen.**
