### FEDERATION IS DISCUSSED

Clubwomen of Umatilla county are interested in the discussion of a county federation of women's clubs. Wade, president of the Pendleton Women's Club and a director of the Oregon State Federation, explained the county federation movement.

According to Federation rules, each federated club of twenty-five members is entitled to two delegates at convention, while the allotment for fifty members is three delegates and for one hundred members, four delegates.
