Has Tonsils Removed

Minnie Kraft, the 14 year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Anton Kraft, was operated upon yesterday at St. Anthony's hospital for tonsils and adenoids. She is convalescing nicely today.

J. A. Folger Dead

J. A. Folger, of the J. A. Folger Co. of San Francisco, well known grocery firm, died suddenly yesterday according to word received here today by Morris Leader, who represents the Folger Co. The firm is the oldest grocery firm on the coast and is well known among local dealers.

400 Pupils Transported

More pupils are transported to and from their homes during the school term in Umatilla county than in any

county in the state, according to a report made by J. A. Churchill, state superintendent of schools, which shows that 400 pupils in this county were provided transportation during the past year. The number of routes in the county totaled 13 and cost per pupil transported was \$29, the report shows. The counties which transport pupils are Benton, Clackamas, Clatsop, Columbia, Coos, Harney, Hood River, Jackson, Lake, Lincoln, Marion, Morrow and Umatilla.

Mrs. Edith G. Van Deusen, home demonstration agent, left today for Hermiston where she will address the girls cooking club. Mrs. Van Deusen will remain in the west end town and tomorrow will hold a nutrition clinic.

Will Work On Reserve

Charles V. Goddard and Frank P. Elson, two Portland ex-service men who are taking advantage of the opportunities afforded by the Federal Board of Vocational guidance, arrived here today and will be employed on the Umatilla National Forest during the summer. They will assist in forest patrol work.

Gets Building Permit

A building permit was issued this morning to R. B. Smith for some remodeling work to his house on Long street. The estimated cost of the work is \$100.

W. H. Thomas Here

W. H. Thomas, owner of the Thomas Shop, of Bartholomew's in Portland and of a Thomas shop in Wenatchee, was in Pendleton this morning on his way east for a buying trip. He will visit Chicago, Cleveland, New York and other eastern cities and will purchase fall and winter models for the three stores.

Million Gallons a Month

The city of Pendleton used 1,998,000 gallons of water for street flushing purposes during the month of June according to the report presented to the city council last night by C. A. Crabtree, street commissioner. During the month, labor to the amount of 1555 hours was put in on the streets, sewer work and weed cutting. The report has it that the condition of the sewers is good with no complaints, but numerous complaints are being received on the prevalence of dust and dirt on the streets, especially on the outer districts. All of the wooden sidewalks in the city need repairs, according to the report, and it is recommended that between 12 and 18 cross walks which are completely gone be torn out.

Were They Scared?

An opportunity for the public to see just how American soldiers looked and acted during the late war when they went over the top to attack enemy positions will be accorded Pendleton tomorrow and Saturday when the official pictures of the war will be shown at the Arcade theater. Those who attend the show during the two days' stay in Pendleton can see how rapidly the men moved, can see the expressions that were on their faces and how they behaved as their comrades fell on the field of battle. The pictures are shown under the auspices of Pendleton Post No. 23, American Legion.

Vinier Leaves for Reunion

Charles C. Vinier, past exalted ruler of Pendleton Lodge 288, B. P. O. E., will leave this evening for Portland where he will join the Portland delegation of Elks who go to Los Angeles for the grand lodge reunion from July 11 to 16 inclusive. An effort will be made by the Oregon "Bills" to secure the endorsement of the national lodge for a playground for Elks on the Metolius river. Portland also is ambitious to secure the reunion for 1924, and it is probable that plans looking toward securing the meeting will be taken this year. Roy Raley and Charles Bond, who with their wives are taking a vacation in California, are expected to be in Los Angeles during the reunion.

Organize This Evening

The final steps in organizing a county federation of commercial bodies of Umatilla county will probably be finished this evening when a meeting of representatives of the various clubs will be held at the offices of the Pendleton Commercial association. The meeting follows the one held last Thursday night here when the plan was broached. The representatives and the towns they represent are: Dr. H. A. Schneider, Pilot Rock; E. E. Tate, Helix; C. S. Cheshire, Milton; R. E. Bean, Fresco; E. P. Dodd, Hermiston; F. M. Gast, Umatilla; Fred George, Echo; and J. D. Zuercher, Stanfield. No word has been received from Weston and Athena as to who will represent those towns.

59 Violators in June

Just 59 persons were found guilty of violating various city ordinances and the state traffic laws during the month of June, City Recorder Thomas Fitzgerald's report to the city council shows. Of this number 45 paid fines, 10 forfeited bail and four served jail sentences. The sum of \$562 was collected on fines. Twenty-five soft drink establishments paid license fees of \$5 each to abide by the ordinance recently enacted by the council. The total value of building work during the month for which permits were taken out was \$11,075. Twelve burial permits were granted during June. The report of Fire Chief W. E. Ringgold shows that there were eight fires with a total loss of \$1000 for the month. Six of the reports were turned in over the system and two were telephoned.

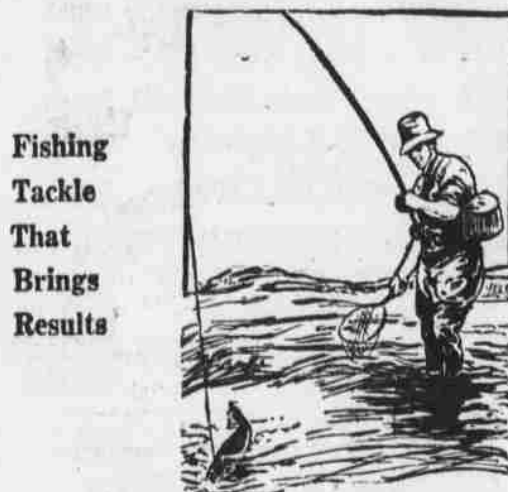

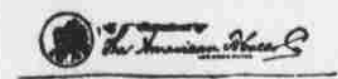
