HOME DEMONSTRATION SEASONABLE SUGGESTIONS FOR BUSY HOUSEWIVES

* With the vacuum seal type of jar, no rubber ring is required.
* There being a rubber-like substance on the inner edge of the metal cover which, when subjected to heat softens, and when cooled hardens, resulting in a perfect seal provided the rubbery substance is good quality. There is a danger to hold the cover in place while the jar is being cooled. This danger should be removed when jar is cold and the seal tested by lifting the jar, holding on to the cover only. If the seal is imperfect the cover comes off in the hand. These covers are removed by puncturing the top with some sharp utensil. As soon as the air can enter, the seal is broken and the cover taken off. New covers are required each time the jar is used.
* The two-piece type of cover should be tested for seal in the same manner.
* Screw-top jars with one-piece covers are tested for perfect seal by turning the jar upside down.
* If it leaks, the rubber cover or jar top are imperfect and must be retested.—E. V. D.

Send extensive exhibits to Pendleton.
Show to Be in Tent
The show will be housed in a tent 100 by 212 feet, located near the O. W. R. & N. freight depot. It will be open day and night and besides the competitive exhibits, there will be many educational ones made by the Umatilla county farm bureau, the various experiment stations and agricultural colleges. They will deal with seed treatment, market classes, cultural methods, the work of experiment stations, plant breeding for higher yield and development of smut resistant wheat.

Frank Groves, assistant county agent, is now securing sheafed grain which he is arranging at Happy Canyon and which will be shown as Umatilla county's part in the exhibit.

Strategy is Attempted.
"As soon as I arrived at the hospital I called Sheriff Johnson, laying the matter entirely before him, but urging that he try to employ some means of getting Fagan away from the woman. We called S. G. Osborn, a neighbor, and instructed him to drive by the Miller home without displaying apparent curiosity and see what was happening. He soon reported that the Miller automobile was missing."

Valley Deems Poses.
Before the trace of the car was gained, however, poses had been formed in every part of the valley. Hundreds of men were searching. Telegrams, with a description of Fagan, a huge, red-headed man with rather a repulsive florid face, were forwarded to all neighboring towns. Guards were posted at roads leading to the valley and at ferry landings, and motorcycle traffic officers were sent both east and west on the Columbia river highway.

Mr. Miller, although his wounds are not considered serious, was in a state of nervous collapse at the Cottage hospital, expressing the fear that Fagan might kill his wife and daughter before they could be rescued.

The ex-convict was said to have declared revenge when he was taken to the penitentiary. He was reported to have told about the city on his return here that he was going to get the girl who caused him prison term, or her entire family.

Miss Watkins was employed at the local hospital when the attempted attack occurred. The young woman tried to avoid him, according to her stories to hospital attendants, as was adduced in testimony at the trial.

Through a ruse he attracted her down town one night and forced her to take an automobile ride. The attack took place while they were in the east apple district. The cries of the woman alarmed residents along the road there, although they did not learn of the trouble until later.

Miss Watkins returned to the hospital in a terribly battered condition. Fagan reported that she had been injured in an accident. After his departure the true story was told by the girl, and the indictment and prosecution followed.

Pardon Granted Fagan.
SALEM, Ore., July 7.—Luther Fagan was received at the state penitentiary here December 4, 1919, to serve a term not to exceed ten years on a charge of criminal assault. He was brought here from Hood River. He escaped from the prison July 13, 1920, while acting as a trustee, but was captured two weeks later by a posse sent out in search of the murderers of Sheriff T. H. Taylor of Pendleton. Fagan was returned to the penitentiary July 29 of this year.

With the exception of making his escape, penitentiary officials said he
