Irregularities Mark
Spotted Stock Market.

NEW YORK, July 13.—(A. P.)—Successive periods of strength, irregularity and steadiness marked desultory and professional operations in the stock market. Total sales of about 350,000 shares, approximately the smallest dealings of the year.

The highest level of prices at the outset was directly due to President Harding's condemnation of the proposed tariff on oil imports. Foreign oils, particularly Mexican and Pan-American Petroleum and General Asphalt, rose two to nearly five points.

Such diversified issues as steels, equipments, shippings, textiles, tobacco, leathers and chemicals, most of which are at premiums because of the small floating supply, also made extreme gains of one to three points.

Shorts stubbornly opposed the advance, however, and before the last half of the session was well under way, many reactions occurred, although gains predominated at the dull close, notwithstanding the sudden rise of call money.

Call loans opened at 6 per cent in contrast to yesterday's easier rate, but isolated borrowers were obliged to pay 6 1/2 per cent. Time rates were unchanged for short maturities.

All foreign exchanges were stronger, sterling recovering about half its recent loss, but Scandinavian quotations were lower.

Dealings in liberty bonds fell away appreciably and the tone was mixed. Great Northern, Northern Pacific and Chicago, Burlington & Quincy issues were strong, international showing no definite trend. Total sales, par value, were \$9,650,000.

Upturn in Wheat
Prices Caused by Reports

CHICAGO, July 13.—(A. P.)—Bullish crop reports from the northwest brought about an upturn in wheat prices yesterday. Opening quotations, which ranged from 4c to 1 1/2c higher with September \$1.13 1/2 @ 1.15 and December \$1.22 @ 1.24 1/2, were followed by moderate additional gains and then something of a reaction. Emphasis on black rust developments in the northwest, together with European drought news, served to increase buying later and to raise values sharply.

The close was strong, 5 3/4 @ 5 1/2c net higher, with September \$1.24 1/2 @ 1.24 3/4 and December \$1.27 @ 1.27 1/2.

Corn, after opening 1-3 @ 1-4c to 1 1/2 @ 1 1/4c, with September at 60 1/2 @ 61c, scored a further advance. Sales of 500,000 bushels to Europe were reported. The market closed strong, 2 1/4 @ 3 1/8c net higher, with September 62 1/2 @ 62 5/8c.

Oats started 1-5c to 2-5 @ 1-2c up, with September 23 3/8 @ 23 1/2c, and later hardened still more. Provisions were firmer with grain, despite weakness in the hog market.

CONSTRUCT LARGE BUILDING
TOKYO, July 13.—(I. N. S.)—Construction work on the new Mitsubishi building, which is to be the largest building in the Orient, will begin in Tokyo within the next few days. The new building will not only be the largest building in Japan, but will also be the largest office building between the Suez Canal and America. It is to cost \$4,000,000 and will face the Tokyo station plaza.
