HOME DEMONSTRATION SEASONABLE SUGGESTIONS FOR BUSY HOUSEWIVES

Among the lessons taught us by the war is the very useful one of serving one-dish dinners. These are carefully planned so that they furnish all the requisites of a balanced meal, and they have the advantage of doing away with an elaborate service and a lot of dishes to wash after the meal is eaten. A casserole or covered making dish is the best thing to use in preparing these one-dish meals. With them it is best to serve a simple dessert or, if they are used for lunch, use raw fruit in place of any dessert. There is enough nutrition in the dish itself so that nothing more is necessary except for the pleasure of contrasting flavor.

Do you find summer dishes washing irksome? This "grind" can be helped by using some of the following suggestions: Put cooking utensils to soak as soon as emptied. Be sure your work table and sink are the right height for you. Have plenty of hot water for washing and scalding. Use a soap shaker in soaping the water and if the water is hard use ammonia. Use a dish drainer. Scald dishes, wiping only the glasses and silver. —E. V. D.
