PROPOSED LIBERIAN LOAN OF FIVE MILLION TO DETERMINE U. S. INFLUENCE IN AFRICA

Black Republic in Desperate Financial Straits Seeks Large Loan From America.

WASHINGTON, July 14.—The State Department today made its recommendations on the application of Liberia for a \$5,000,000 loan.

For a \$5,000,000 loan is now before Congress for final decision. Whether the United States is to continue as the dominant foreign influence in the African republic or is to resign that place to Great Britain probably depends upon the attitude taken by Congress.

Reports here indicate that British interests, which now practically control the country, are ready to advance credits, and there is also some indication that French capitalists would welcome an opportunity to come to the assistance of the black republic.

Despite the fact that Liberia is perhaps the poorest of the nations of the west coast of Africa, the Liberian Government is practically bankrupt and must have further outside assistance in the immediate future. As far back as 1871 the black republic was forced to seek foreign loans, and it was British capital which responded.

Conditions had become so unfavorable in 1908 that in response to an invitation from Liberia an American commission was sent to investigate the conditions of the country. The commission's report, which was made public, resulted in a new loan agreement under which an international receivership was formed with the general receivership reserved to the United States, and Great Britain, France and Germany participating.

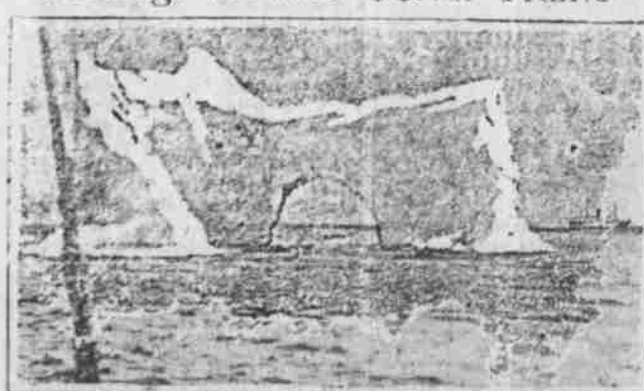
After Liberia entered the war the German receiver was expelled, the German cable and radio stations, as well as German private property, being left in the hands of the American receiver general as alien property custodian. During the war the economic condition of the black republic became very acute. The people were on the verge of starvation and the Government was forced to enter into an agreement for a loan from the Bank of British West Africa, Limited, an English concern which practically controls the banking situation in Liberia, just to the Elder Dempster Company, a British steamship line, practically controls the transportation facilities of the republic.

U. S. Disposed Favorably
Early in 1918 Liberia made an appeal to the Secretary of the Treasury of the United States for a loan of \$5,000,000. A commission headed by Charles Doolittle Burgess King, president of Liberia, came to Washington recently to negotiate the loan. On April 15 President King was received by President Harding and from time to time members of the commission have been in conference with officials of the Treasury and State Departments.

While there has been no official announcement as to the recommendation made by Secretary Hughes on the advisability of the loan, the traditional policy of the United States towards Liberia, would suggest favorable consideration. The original colony on the west coast of Africa was founded under the auspices of President Monroe, and in 1847 the United States intervened when the little colony entered into a customs dispute with the British colony of Sierra Leone.

Defining the American attitude toward Liberia, Daniel Webster said in 1813: "We have long viewed Liberia as a deep-impregnated in the hearts of the people of Liberia, and is expected to extend a full degree of our mature protection."

MAKES REPORT ABOUT DAMAGE DONE WHEAT BY WORK OF MAGOT

Yield Near Baker Cut From Six to 10 Bushels This Year by Pest New to This Section.

BAKER, Ore., July 14.—James How the report that the wheat fields of Baker county are being attacked by a new pest, the maggot, is not the first time that the pest has been found in the county. The report also indicates that there is a positive means of eradicating the little fellow that has been seen only in the intermountain section.

Avery, county agent for Baker county, and since he has made an exhaustive study of the life of the little fellow, which feeds from the ploughman's seed, it is known as the maggot. Being small, the flies are difficult to see and the ordinary examination would not find them without the use of a net. It should be safe to plant fall wheat this year as usual with little damage. The crop of wheat has come through the winter this year although injured by the maggot, will produce a very good yield. The latest injury done by the crop is the killing back of the stems after the wheat has started to joint. 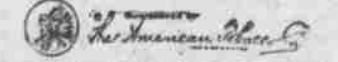
