## HOME DEMONSTRATION SEASONABLE SUGGESTIONS FOR BUSY HOUSEWIVES

Cloth moths are a serious pest in this section of the country because the climate favors their existence. The following treatment is recommended for valuable furs and woolens: Hang the article out in the bright sunshine for half a day. Then heat the garment thoroughly and place it in a well made, durable pasteboard or carton box. Seal the open joints carefully with adhesive paper tape. This will keep the articles in good shape as long as the seals are not broken and the packages remain entirely closed.

Should the goods that are attacked by cloth moths be part of a room's furnishings, such as curtains and rugs, get two pounds of naphthalene flakes and scatter under the rug and around the baseboard, preferably when the temperature is 60 degrees Fahrenheit or over. Close the room up for 24 hours. Then beat the rugs and sweep up the naphthalene for future use. The flake form of naphthalene is faster working than the same in balls. By scattering the flakes in bureau drawers and moths are repelled.—E. V. D.

Whitlock said that in Minnesota, over a period of 10 years, six per cent of the wheat went into the No. 1 class.

**Gives Report.**

He also said that in the past two years, check kept on 2000 cars each year showed that 14 per cent of the wheat graded at Portland and Astoria met the test.

Senator Cox made the statement that in his opinion the main objection to the 60 pound test was that some wheat was shipped south and some east and had to take the 60 pound test. Mr. Thompson said that while Umatilla county wheat contains more gluten than some other wheats it falls down in the test because it does not contain the moisture found in wheat of other localities. The tests are the same, he said, and this works a hardship.

**Power Is Limited.**

Mr. Whitlock pointed out that while the federal government does the grain grading, it has no authority beyond that.

"If farmers and buyers," he said, "wish to use samples they may do so. The government has authority over standards, not over discounts and this is a matter for buyers and growers, not for inspectors and graders."

He added that if farmers are dissatisfied with the 60 pound test, the matter should be taken up with the secretary of agriculture.

Besides the Umatilla county farmers who attended the meeting, those here from Walla Walla were Senator Cox, John Hoffman, Henry Vincent, Peter Weidert, John Weidert, Harry Reynolds, J. E. Painter and Jim Daeres.
