Sensational Advances (From the Oregon Journal.) Hogs were scarce and seasonally higher, cattle showed a slow and depressed tone while sheep started under pressure with a record run in the alleys at North Portland for the week's opening.

The sale was made at \$7.50. Despite the most excellent showing there was considerable weakness in the general trade. Much of the record run came on contract to killers and did not enter the open market. Bidding for the remainder was extremely slow.

Germany Proves Heavy Buyer of London Wool. The heaviest buying at the recent London wool sales was done by Germans. Commenting on the subject, the Bradford correspondent of the Public Ledger said: "Nothing has called forth so much comment as the German competition for wool at the recent sales, and if full operatives in the West Riding could have seen the keenness of German buying there would have been great surprise expressed. Out of 104,000 bales sold, 70,000 bales were taken for the continent, and about 70 per cent of that quantity was taken by Germany.

While export houses in Bradford are finding it almost impossible to resume business with their old customers on account of high conversion costs, France, Belgium and Germany are all keenly interested in pushing their wares into eastern Europe, whenever they see the least chance of getting paid for their goods.

Summer Quiet Prevails On Stock Market. NEW YORK, July 19.—(A. P.)—Business on the stock market yesterday totaled scarcely 232,000 shares. Irregular price movements revealed weakness in certain specialties and comparative steadiness in seasoned issues.

Atlantic Gulf, under constant pressure in connection with litigation involving the company's finances, made an extreme decline of 2 1/2 points. Mexican Petroleum gained three points at one time, but reacted sharply on heavy offerings, finishing at a loss of 1 1/4 points. Representative steel equipments and motors resisted pressure, as well as specialties in the leather, textile and sugar groups. Rails moved within contracted limits, some leaders being quoted. Foreign exchanges were more unsettled. Demand sterling registered a new low quotation for the year at \$2.59 3/8. French, Italian, Swiss, Dutch and German rates fell four to 10 points, with losses of 17 to 50 points in remittances to Denmark, Norway and Sweden. Last week's loss of cash reserves by clearing house banks failed to disturb local money rates. On the exchange all call loans were made at 6 per cent and the little time money available was offered at the same figure. Some

ARIZONA MAN HAS BEEN APPOINTED NEW HEAD OF AGRICULTURE O.A.C. OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, Corvallis, July 19.—H. H. Gibson, professor of vocational agriculture in the University of Arizona and formerly director of agricultural education in Vermont university, has been appointed head of the department of agricultural education at the college. He will relieve E. L. Dossee, acting head, who will devote his entire time to teaching and Spauld Hughes work.

Professor Gibson will have charge of courses in preparation of teachers in agriculture for public elementary and secondary schools, together with courses in education. He will do much investigational and research work. He will publish material of general agricultural interest, particularly in cooperation with the board of vocational education under the Smith Hughes law. He has had broad educational and practical farm experience.
