GOOD MONEY PAID BY FIGHT FANS TO SEE CONTESTS IN SIDNEY

Boxers Reap Harvest of Coin in Australia Where Many Americans Have Remained.

Boxing is still booming in Australia and good fighters are making good money. Boxers from all parts of the world are turning their eyes toward Sydney, and the bags full of letters and dope sheets in each mail show how anxious they are to get in for their cut of the big dough that is being cheerfully paid out by boxing fans.

Just at the present time quite a number of famous boxers are here, or on their way. In addition to Decio Babeni, the Filipino champion, Flores, another Filipino champ, and the wonderful Filipino boy, Macario Villon, we have two colored boxers who arrived in Sydney from America last week.

Billy Shadoe is in Sydney again, after a successful tour through Melbourne, and Jimmy Clabby is still among the fast high lights. Charlie May a Prisco featherweight, is leaving for Sydney this month and several other American and English fighters have been booked up.

Good lightweights and featherweights are still wanted for Sydney, as in another month's time Stadium, Ltd., will have a circuit for six houses under their management. Men of other weights in different parts of the world can get into touch with Jack Munro at the Stadium, Roushtrous, Syd, Sydney if they desire a trip. Only real fighters need apply, however. Men who can go twenty rounds are the type that are wanted. Middleweights and light heavies should also communicate with Sydney, as big money is awaiting big men who carry the goods.

Godfrey Stops Decio. Sid Godfrey, ex-featherweight champion of Australia, met Decio Cabanela of Decio, as he is called here, at the Sydney Stadium, and at

the end of the seventeenth round Decio collapsed and was carried out. Decio gave away over ten pounds in weight, was outboxed and overpowered in every way, so that his performance was really a very creditable one.

A capacity house witnessed the contest, the having favoring Decio despite the difference in weights. Decio's wonderful display against the Frenchman, Criqui, whom he cut to ribbons for fourteen rounds, strongly influenced the odds in his favor.

Criqui stopped Godfrey in ten rounds some time ago, and few thought that he had any chance with the fierce little Filipino. The advantages, however, were all in Godfrey's favor, and the scrap was for the best part one-sided.

Shadoe Still Going Strong. Billy Shadoe, the San Francisco light-heavyweight, is still going strong in Australia. So far he has only lost one contest and that on a foul at a time when he looked a million to one winner. His record so far has been practically all K. O.'s. He has stopped Eddie Hinton, Fred Kay, Tommy Cross (Australian middleweight champion), Francis Charles (welterweight champion of France), Ray Lockwood, heavyweight champion of the Orient, Jack Quinlan (heavyweight champion of Victoria), and has beaten Jimmy Clabby.

BOYS AND GIRLS IN PIG CLUBS TO SHOW ANIMALS AT FAIRS

OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, Corvallis July 20.—Special pig showing contests will be held next fall at all county fairs, state fair, and the Pacific International Livestock show, to be open to all members of boys' and girls' pig clubs who show pure-bred pigs of any recognized breed.

Judges will consider 50 per cent for preparing the pig to show under the following points. Condition of feet and trimming of toes; trimming of ears and tail; washing and cleanliness of ears, belly, head, and flanks; and condition of coat, including gloss, absence of oil, and use of objectionable materials. The remaining 50 per cent will be based on the showing of the pig, including control of animal by the exhibitor, noise and eagerness of exhibitor, skill in showing, including continuous attention, keeping the pig played to advantage, and being on the job, and ability to stand, move, or drive the pig as requested by the judge.

DEMPSEY MAY GO BACK EAST IN AN EFFORT TO FIND WORTHY OPPONENT

Few Fighters in Country Have Mettle That Entitles Them to Meet Carpenter's Victor.

Fighting is Dempsey's trade and it is the only way he can make big money. All-moving news and theatrical ventures have never enriched him to any great extent.

Were Dempsey a veteran of the ring or a fading champion, he probably would seek capitalization of his title without risking it. He might join a circus as Jess Willard did, become a movie actor, take out a hotel, show or bowl over a few seasons.

But he prefers to fight. Isn't he the old fellow?

Four former champions have been "traded" for sideshowing the top-25 babies while they gathered in the shovels by merely exhibiting themselves. Dempsey has been "traded" for everything but that.

The champion makes it plain that he is not looking for seconds. He is willing to fight anybody. Tex Rickard selects for him. So far from picking up the easy money he is disinclined to enter the ring with men who do not have a chance with him.

There are two good reasons for this. One is that Dempsey is only 26 and at the peak of his fighting form. He thinks he is good enough to beat any man. His reason for not boxing men who would be "seconds" for him is that he is afraid he may hurt them. Jack is beginning to realize the power of his punch.

At the present time there isn't a man in sight who looks fit to battle Dempsey on Labor Day. Jess Willard would require more than two months to get ready. He says as himself, Fred Fulton probably would make as good a showing as Willard if Dempsey chose to make a show start. The Polton will always remember that time he hit a "hooker" at Harrison, N. J. A scuffle between Frank Moran and Carpenter might be interesting. It would demonstrate the speed of the European champion, and possibly Frank might land old "Mary Ann." However, it probably would be a disappointing exhibition if it went more than a few rounds.

REPUBLICAN EDITORS WOULD REMOVE GOV.

SEATTLE, July 20.—(U. P.)—Republican editors of the state of Washington plan the removal of Governor Hart by resignation. This impeachment and recall is the result of discontent over the governors' inaction in state affairs. The movement was started when the republican editors met at Paradise Inn, Kettle Falls, in a three days session of the Washington State Press Association. Frank H. Seitz, editor of the Bellingham Herald, is planning the details of the meeting and during the week will start the actual movement toward the contemplated end.
