GOVERNMENT CHIEFS ADOPT ROLES AS "HUMANIZERS" IN EFFORT TO SECURE TEAM WORK

Cabinet Officials Let Employees Know Latchstrings Are Hung Outside Their Offices.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 1.—The government now has some more shining lights in the role of "humanizers." Some of them deserve the beautifully-fashioned verbal bouquets showered upon them.

There's Will Hays. A postmaster-general whose dignity is not so august that he deigns to stoop and shake the withered hand of a poor but worthy scribbling woman, according to a lovely place on his payroll. Not a village cross-roads post office that has not felt the kindly touch of that masterful personality. He's sowing seeds of kindness and reaping remarkable dividends in raised efficiency in every end of the postal service.

There's Harry Laugherty. An attorney general who believes that justice and mercy is the kind that makes the strongest appeal to the best in man or woman. Laugherty takes the view that most men are absolutely honest. He maintains there is good in all men even in the worst of them. An unfortunate misstep by an offender does not stamp him as fit for the boy-scouts. That's not the way with Mr. Laugherty. He may have to handle a case product, and he's had a lot of examples passed up to him since he took over the department of justice. But it takes Laugherty, a wizard in human nature studies, to find the good in men that everyone else has overlooked.

There's David H. Blair. When President Harding picked Blair to do one of the toughest jobs laid out for any man in the government service he selected another great humanizer. Blair blows no trumpets. He makes no grandiloquent speeches though he can

make a cracker-jack speech on occasion. This boss collector of Uncle Sam's revenues, after being in office a bare month, has all of the 29,000 men and women of the internal revenue bureau behind him, and the reason is this: When Blair took over the job the first thing he did was to call in the chiefs of the divisions and say about one dozen words. That's about all he said. Then he shook hands all around. Then he let everybody know that the latchstring of his office hung on the outside. No functionaries were to be allowed to block the path to Blair's office if they had a reasonable excuse for getting in.

Teamwork Makes the Team.
But here's what got the revenue force Blair's few words of greeting was a little story of a shortstop on Blair's home team who simply was a shrewd and unobtrusive, when he was backed up with proper support, he was a bad loser when this support was lacking. Blair blazed himself to that shortstop. He intended to be a winner but needed that support which he had a right to expect and demand. He's getting it, too, all along the line. That little baseball team was Blair's only speech by way of introducing himself but it has gone the rounds of the revenue service from coast to coast.

Herbert Hoover, secretary of commerce, is winning by his course as a consistent humanizer. Hoover probably sees more victors than any other member of the cabinet. It is not difficult to get an appointment with him, because Hoover has the keenest realization of the fact that his work now is public service, and his door is wide open to those who have a mission. One of the first things that Mr.

Hoover did when he entered the commerce department was to get closer to his thousands of employees, letting them all know that he was personally interested in them and that he would go the limit for them, but he wanted efficiency. Hoover began slashing into the "red tape" and knocking down precedents and wedding old waste and overlapping effort. There isn't an employee in the many bureaus under Hoover's control who does not feel a personal interest in his boss, because they know he has a genuine interest in them.

These are a few samples. Their number might be multiplied. But it is a fact that Washington has really opened its eyes at some of the wholesome innovations sprung by higher officials in their really sincere efforts to democratize the government service and make employees feel that they are not just so many inanimate cogs in a great machine.

STINN'S GETS HOLD IN S. A.
BUENOS AIRES, Aug. 1.—(U. P.)—Hugo Stinnes, the German industrial king, has extended his operations to the Argentine. In the territory of Neuquen he has acquired large tracts of land and has already sunk several oil wells, some of which are actually producing.

The fuel problem is one of the most vital to the industrial life of this republic. No coal mines have yet been exploited on a commercial scale and the only oil yet found comes from the government fields at Comodoro Rivadavia, in Patagonia. These wells produced 250,000 tons last year.

JAPANESE COURT IS INFLUENCED BY WHAT PRINCE HAS LEARNED

Prince Hirohito Has Caused Astonishment of Official Circles by His Democratic Ways.

PARIS, Aug. 1.—(U. P.)—Prince Hirohito, the imperial visitor from Japan, has caused astonishment in official European circles by his democratic ways and his total departure from the traditions that have bound his ancestors from times immemorial, while the members of the Japanese community of Paris have looked on less surprised at the doings of their special leader.

Knowing the formality which surrounds personages of the imperial family in the court of Japan, officials here were puzzled as to what attitude they should assume towards the special envoy of the land of the Rising Sun. Whether they might shake hands with him, or talk freely with him as they had with the Prince of Wales or whether indeed their actions might be wrongly interpreted as lacking in respect.

They were agreeably surprised when they found in the young lad of twenty no trace of the aloofness they had expected, but a smiling youth interested in the new experience he was undergoing and eager to learn the ways of the people among whom he was thrown. The prince for his part makes no secret of it, he is enjoying himself thoroughly and is frankly pleased with the treatment he is being accorded.

The prince's latest departure from precedent was a tea and bridge party at which he was host to a small gathering of Japanese ladies, wives of the members of the embassy staff. The guests were received in the prince's private suite at the embassy on the Avenue Hoche. The gathering was quite informal and the guests were made to feel entirely at their ease.

He next entertained the ambassador and secretaries of the embassy to a luncheon in the course of which he related to them some of his impressions of Paris. He expressed himself as particularly interested in the shops and window displays. The prince is doing his own shopping. He wishes to see the Paris shops himself and select personally the presents he will bring back to Japan.

A few days ago he drove up to one of the most fashionable jewelers of the Rue de la Paix and selected a diamond necklace as a present for his mother, the empress. The necklace, a beautiful chain of diamonds with two large diamond pendants, was the prince's own choice.

For his own use the prince has acquired a collection of fancy Parisian canes, which will no doubt become a new vogue at the court of the mikado.

Avails from Sleep of Century.
TOKYO, Aug. 1.—(U. P.)—Reports of the travels of the crown prince in various countries in Europe are being published at great length in Japan, and the accounts of the democratic mingling of this descendant of the gods with mere ordinary mortals are being received with wonderment, but, as a rule, with satisfaction.

The imperial household, the stronghold of all that is conservative and resistant to ancient ceremonial, has even begun to awaken from its sleep of centuries, and it is given out that on the return of the crown prince many reforms are to be carried out, when such ancient ceremonial will be replaced by more modern doings.

Thus it is understood that the Imperial household is considering abandoning the present rule which prevents publication of pictures of the crown prince without specific permission having been granted. Admission to certain of the imperial grounds is also to be made easier, and some of the vast lands held by royalty may be opened for use by the people.

The prospect of a visit in Japan by the Prince of Wales has brought up the point that at that time it will be necessary for the crown prince to entertain his royal visitor at some theatre, and many ceremonial complications must be considered.

To a westerner the shy little steps taken by Japan in the direction of democracy are quite amusing, for royal

Woman's National Foundation Plans Construction of Temple of Triumph to Women.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 1.—(U. P.)—The oft-repeated question as to who were America's greatest women will shortly receive a final answer, when the Women's National Foundation incorporates in its club house here a Hall of Remembrance. While the concrete objective of this foundation which was inaugurated some weeks ago by a group of social leaders in Washington, D. C., is to provide an all-partisan meeting place for the women of America and an all-inclusive clearing house of information on their activities, it also aims to act as a source of inspiration and a record of achievement for their sex. The Hall of Remembrance is designed to fill these fast-named needs.

As now proposed this hall is the conception of Mrs. George Barnett, wife of Major-General George Barnett, United States marine corps, and chairman of the executive committee of the Women's National Foundation, who submitted it to Mrs. C. C. Calhoun, foundation president, by whom it was approved and placed before the board of governors.

Mrs. Barnett suggested that in the hall, which would be the main auditorium of the foundation, there be erected forty-eight pillars representing the forty-eight states. On these pillars would be inscribed the names of the women who from pioneer days to the present time have helped to make state history and, incidentally, make America. These names would be selected by a commission in each state consisting of prominent women educators and historians. The governors would be invited to nominate the commission, whose findings would be finally passed on by a special national committee of four or five distinguished citizens. The only restriction in the selection of names will be the exclusion of all women now living.

To Build Temple of Triumph.
As Mrs. Barnett's plan received instantaneous approval from the governors of the Foundation, as well as from Mrs. Calhoun, it is expected that the state commissions will be appointed soon and the work of historical research begun. There is anticipated little difficulty in choosing the heroines of pioneer days. Virginia, for example, will have the name of Pocahontas the savior of Jamestown Colony, and Mary Ball, mother of George Washington. North Carolina will probably be equally unanimous, concerning her Virginia Dare. South Carolina's Rebecca Motte stands out undisputed. There is Betty Ross, in Philadelphia; Molly Pitcher, in New Hampshire, while Kentucky has the beloved name of Nancy Hanks. When one comes nearer the present days, however, the perspective is bound to be less sure on the value of individual achievements, and it is here that suggestions will need careful examination and solid substantiation from the proponents.

In order that the Hall of Remembrance, with its columns of famous names may announce to the passerby as well as to those present within its significance for the present day, Mrs. Calhoun has proposed that it be embodied in a classic temple of triumph surmounted by the triumphant figure of a woman.

CANADIAN TRADE DOOMS
OTTAWA, Ont., Aug. 1.—Italy has increased its imports from Canada over 300 per cent in a year, according to the report of the department of trade and commerce for the fiscal year, just ended. In the preceding twelve months Italy spent \$17,000,000 for Canadian products; last year its purchases totaled \$57,750,000. Most of this was invested in wheat grown on the western prairies which are rapidly being settled by farmers. France is Canada's next customer among European continental nations, according to the report, which further shows sharp increases in exports to Sweden, Norway, Turkey, Spain, and Portugal. Exports for the year were more than twenty times those of twenty years ago.

USE OF PAREGORIC BY MOTHERS GIVES SEED TO DRUG ADDICTION

BOSTON, Aug. 1.—(U. P.)—Widespread traffic in drugs between New York and Boston is charged by State Director of Registration William S. Belry. Children become introduced to drugs through the administration of paregoric by their mothers, according to Belry.

"It is an attractive 'get-rich quick' scheme," he said, referring to the illicit traffic. "An investment of \$100 buys one ounce of morphine and if sold hypodermically in the streets of Boston, nets \$1,745. Is it any wonder that men and women prey upon the young people when so great a revenue is easily made?"

"In one square mile in Boston, it is estimated by officers that from thirty-five to forty men and girls peddle dope, and we find it concealed in all manner of ways, such as baby carriages and crucifixes. Estimates by detectives and officers are that from 250 to 300 men and women are engaged in the illegal sale of opium, morphine, heroin and cocaine on the streets of Boston."

He declared an auto express line is in operation between New York and this city.

"Chloroform addicts are also found in Boston," he declared. "The habit commences in babyhood. It is a dangerous habit to give children" paregoric and good meaning parents little realize that it is an opium preparation."
